"In the last few weeks public attention has again been drawn to the contamination of the surface of the sea by films of oil which not only endanger the life of sea-fowl, fish, and the smaller sea animals on which the latter feed, but have even become a source of fire risk owing to the absorption of the oil by the wooden substructures of

"The blame is usually placed with the commercial vessel using oil fuel, though it has been pointed out that oil is too valuable a commodity to be carelessly wasted by owners of vessels. On the other hand, it is possible that quantities of fuel too small to be an appreciable source of loss to the ship may be sufficient to cause serious contamination owing to the surprising power of oil to spread over a large

"This spreading is not primarily due to the force of gravity, since it occurs also on solid surfaces which are not horizontal, but is caused by chemical forces of attraction between the ultimate particles, or 'molecules,' of the oil and those of the substance on which it rests. These forces strive to bring every molecule of oil into intimate contact with the water below, so that as a rule oil will spread till it forms a layer only one molecule thick.
