America's Justice Delays

"Russell T. Scott is the most striking illustration to date of the delays and uncertainties in the administration of justice. Brought to trial for the murder of Joseph Maurer, a clerk in a drug store, he first pleaded guilty, hoping thereby to move the court to leniency. He was

sentenced to be hanged," says the New Republic.

"His attorney, however, urged that he had mistakenly advised his client to throw his life away, and Scott was allowed to change his plea to not guilty. He was convicted on December 22, 1924, and once more sentenced to be hanged. Three times his attorneys secured a stay. The day before one of Scott's executions the governor received a telegram apparently from Robert Scott, brother of the condemned man, and accompanied in the hold-up in which Maurer was killed, confessing his own guilt and offering to surrender himself.

"Scott was reprieved for a week, but his brother failed to appear. Then at 2 a.m., four hours before the time set for the final execution, Scott's lawyers secured a writ of inquiry into his mental condition. The employees of the jail where Scott was confined and five alienists summoned by the Government pronounced him sane; five alienists produced by Scott's attorneys declared him insane.

"The jury took the latter view, on the ground that Scott's experience with justice would shatter the mind of any man. According to their verdict, the State is guilty of the crime of depriving a man of his reason when he was sentenced only to lose his life—or perhaps his legal authorities might secure a verdict of insanity. But you can't bring the State to the gallows or put it in the insane asylum."

Little Things Count

The story is told of a quick lunch man who nearly ruined his business by serving his coffee too hot. He opened up in a fine location and seemed to do a rushing business in the middle of the day. At the end of the week, however, he found he barely broke even. It took him quite a while to find out what the trouble was.

The noon lunch period was only of about two hours duration. The man operating the coffee urn served the drink so hot that practically each and every customer had to wait five or six minutes before he could drink it. This made each person take longer for his lunch than he would otherwise and as every seat was occupied, other patrons were kept out. When the trouble was found out and corrected, trade increased thirty-three per cent. and the business began to pay. This shows how little things count in business.—Financial Post.

Message From Missing Woman

BARNSTABLE—"I have not the slightest doubt that she had been murdered, and after visiting the scene of her disappearance I have come to the conclusion that the body is buried in one of the fields at the top of Coxleigh Woods."

This is the declaration of Mr. Geo. Eschby, of Cardiff, a spiritualistic medium of 15 years' standing, in response to the strange case of Mrs. Mary Harvey, the 51 year old Barnstable widow who has been missing since she went gathering blackberries with Mrs. Hart, a friend, in Coxleigh Woods, on September 11.

"I Was Buried."

Mr. Eschby, who has been spending a holiday at Barnstable, claims to have received two "spirit" messages from Mrs. Harvey.

"I got into communication with her in the beyond," he said to me, though being allowed by Mrs. Hart to hold in my hand for a few minutes the missing woman's pension book. I received the following message:

"After Mrs. Hart left me in the wood I went on with the picking of blackberries for nearly half an hour by myself, when a man came up to me and stabbed me on the head with a heavy stick. I became unconscious and my body was buried in the vicinity of the wood after darkness had set in. It was quite true you will not see me again alive on earth. I am sure Mrs. Hart never knew the man who attacked me."

"No Doubt."

Mr. Eschby said the message came very clearly to him, and that he had not the slightest doubt about the correctness of it. "The fact that there have been so many hundreds searching for her all through the woods unsuccessfully goes to prove that her body had been done away with," he said. "I have not communicated with the police, as I did not like to do so until I got something more definite. Time alone will tell whether there is anything in these messages."

The police state that there is no evidence of a man having been in the vicinity of Coxleigh Woods on September 11.

Barnstable people, who have been searching for Mrs. Harvey by night and day for a fortnight, beating down the dense undergrowth of the extensive woods, dragging the river and exploring every pit, call on Mr. Eschby to produce a third "spirit" message that will indicate the exact spot where Mrs. Harvey's body may be found. Here, they say, is a test case for spiritualism.

He hopes to persuade others to join in his campaign.

Crawl Stroke for Motorboats

The Australian crawl principle that produces some of our fastest swimmers now has been applied to motorboats. A new propeller invented in Austria resembles a pair of double arms, mounted on a horizontal shaft in the same position as a screw propeller. These do not rotate, however, but oscillate, suggestive of the kick-stroke of the crawl.

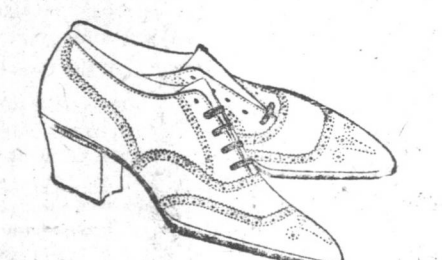
