## AMERICAN JINGOES

LONDON, Jan. 10th.—The London  
Times Washington correspondent in  
reporting the speeches of Senators  
McKellar and Phelan in the senate  
on the oil policy of Great Britain  
says:

"Those that realize that Irish agi-  
tators in America have long looked  
and still look with comfortable cer-  
tainty to the oil interests for the  
wherewithal to support their cam-  
paign, will be surprised that Senator  
Phelan referred to the Irish ques-  
tion."

The correspondent adds: "These  
speeches, with their mixture of invec-  
tive and distortion of facts, are typical  
of much that is now going on. One  
might search the vast field of Amer-  
ican publications without finding any  
hint of recognition of the fact that  
the immensity of the British debt to  
America is largely due to the exhaus-  
tion of our credit by the American  
demand for our endorsement of the  
American loans to France, Russia  
and others."

"Much is heard of sinister British oil  
activity in Mesopotamia, but nothing  
of American concessions in Palestine;  
much of British oil intrigues, but  
nothing of Standard Oil. Much of this  
criticism is haphazard, but much is  
deliberate."

"Not without reason do we find in  
the published appeals by the Amer-  
ican-British Federation of Massachu-  
setts the statement that the promotion  
of a breach and possible war between  
Great Britain and the United States  
has become one of the cardinal objects  
of a general revolutionary program,  
and that various racial and political  
groups which make this country the  
theatre of their agitation, are working  
with a common understanding in a  
movement lavishly financed and pow-  
erfully organized."

"England must remember that there  
is a great mass of sober citizens un-  
likely to be cajoled or coerced, but the  
extent and bitterness of anti-British  
propaganda should not be under-esti-  
mated."

Sir Chas. Greenway, chairman of  
the Anglo-Persian Oil company, inter-  
viewed by the Daily Express on Sena-  
tor McKellar's proposal that Ameri-  
can oil should be denied to Great Brit-  
ain unless Americans were permitted  
to exploit Mesopotamian fields, said:

"It is too absurd to be worthy of  
serious consideration, and I am con-  
vinced the good sense of the Ameri-  
can people will prevent them from re-  
garding it as anything but an exhibi-  
tion of childish petulance. The ab-  
surdity of the proposal lies in the fact  
that the American oil interests, if it  
were carried out, would be cutting off  
their nose to spite their face."

"They would be depriving them-  
selves of their best foreign market and  
of enormous annual profits. At the  
same time it would reduce the balance  
of trade in favor of United States to  
the extent of not less than \$50,000,000  
a year. Moreover, such action would  
still further encourage, in fact it  
would compel, military and economic  
interests to make every possible effort  
to render themselves independent of  
American oil and thus permanently de-  
prive the American producers of the  
profits they are now drawing from  
their export oil trade. But then, as  
I said before, I refuse to take the pro-  
posal seriously. It can only be Sena-  
tor McKellar's idea of an internation-  
al joke."

The Vienna correspondent of the  
Labor paper, the Daily Herald, sends  
a despatch which the paper published  
under the heading:

"The Standard Oil Rule, New Pol-  
ish Dictator Their Servant."

The new Polish Dictator, according  
to the Herald correspondent, is Fin-  
ance Minister Steczkowski, who is de-  
clared to have been invested with far-  
reaching authority to float Polish con-  
cessions on foreign markets.

"Thus," says the correspondent, "he  
has already enabled the Standard Oil  
trust to gain control of the Polish  
Naptha Corporation, a huge concern

possessing about 15 per cent of all  
the Galician oil fields.

"It is reported on good authority  
that during his visit to Warsaw last  
week, the American senator McCor-  
mick conducted negotiations with the  
Pilsudski government with a view to  
securing the whole Polish Railway  
system for American capitalists."

"These negotiations were carried on  
secretly, and, I am informed, led to a  
result highly satisfactory to McCor-  
mick's Wall Street friends."

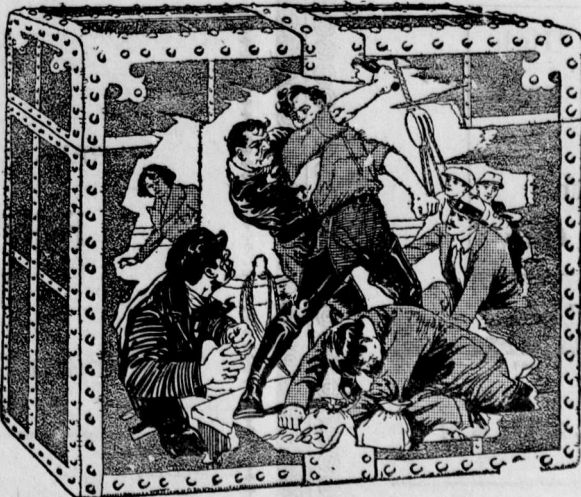
