The Bishop's bell brought the Synod to order for the afternoon session at 2:45 o'clock. The vote on the candidates for the position of secretary-treasurer resulted as follows: J. M. McWhinney, 94; C. F. Complin, 58; W. Swaisland, 24, J. J. Rooney, 1; J. L. Geddes, 10, Mr. McWhinney thus secured the necessary majority. Mr. McWhinney is a barrister of three years' standing, resides in Chatham and is clerk of the vestry of Christ Church there. He is aged 28 and unmarried. The position was formally tendered Mr. McWhinny, the matter of securities etc., to be arranged by the Executive Committee.

That Rev. R. McCosh receive a grant of 330 to meet expenses of a trip to Ottawa in the interest of the Board of Managers.

That he committee be appointed to confer with respect to the erection of the Synod buildings and improvement of cathedral.

That the committee on revising the constitution appointed at the last Synod be responded by the present Synod.

Rev. Alfred Brown moved an amendment to canno 29 to enccurage the building up of parishes. In support of the amendment Mr. Brown made a lively speech. He proposed granting a lump sum of \$300 instead of the annual grant of \$100 to elergymen, who were not provided with a rectory.

On motion of Archdeacon Marsh the amendment was declared out of order.

Rev. W. A. Young took up the question of the security of loans and moved the following in order to secure the Synod against all possible losses:

A large number of ladies occupied seats in the gallery when the evening session was called to order. The report of the committee appointed to look into the question of "lay help" came up for consideration. The committee had found it advisable to refer the matter to a sub-committee which recom-

committee had found it advisable to refer the matter to a sub-committee which recommended substantially as follows:

That it is expedient that in every parish young men be associated in guilds, and that definite work be assigned them.

That one or more persons be licensed by the Bishop to assist the clergyman in the discharge of his duties in the office of lay readers.

That congregational meetings be encouraged as a useful means of quickening church life, promoting fellowship and encouraging activity.

Judge Woods made a few remarks respecting the arrangement of the Prayer Book and suggested that some improvement be made in that direction.

The report was then formally adopted and the Synod adjourned.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.
