Probabilities: Toronto, Nov. 6-1 a.m. —Lower lakes: Generally fair, with a lower temperature; local snow flurries or light snow falls.

Local Temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory here on Saturday were 49 and 22 above; on Sunday, 35 and 25.5 above.

THE LAST SAD RITES.

Remains of the Late Conductor Morden Taken to Hamilton for Interment.

—A Large Masonic Funeral.

The remains of the late Conductor Wm. Morden were conveyed to Hamilton yesterday for interment in the family plot. At 12:30 o'clock service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Daniel at the family residence, 280 Talbot street, and attended by a large number of sorrowing friends. Many and very beautiful floral tributes to the memory of deceased had been sent by friends. When the remains were being conveyed to the G. T. R. station to meet the Wabash express, the members of Richard Coeur de Lion Precinctory of Knights Templar formed the escort, and marched in full uniform. There were in the escort: R. E. Kingsmill, Jun., W. A. Wilson, John T. Stephenson, Francis A. Andrews, Thomas Edwards, S. Chiera, and Samuel J. Southcott. A number of other knights in civilian dress were also present, and included Mr. M. McKenzie, of St. Elizabeth Precinctory, Stratford; Mr. Burton, of Godfrey de Bouillon Precinctory, Hamilton; and Mr. Brydges, of Apollo Commandery, Chicago. The uniformed Templars formed a passion cross and marched at the head of the cortege.

On the arrival of the train the Order

of Railway Conductors, to which deceased had belonged, took charge of the remains. The pall-bearers from this order were Conductors M. McKenzie, John Gillson, W. Subwab, Hugh O'Donnell, Adam Douglass and Thomas Hill. Conductors T. C. Jones and J. McLaughlin accompanied the body to Hamilton, where the cortege was met at the station by the members of Barton Lodge and Godfrey de Bouillon Precinctory of that city, who then conducted the funeral. The members of the bereaved family remain in Hamilton for a few days.

Accession of Members in Various Churches.

Ladies Conduct the Entire Service at the Colborne Street Methodist Church—Other Notes.

In Charge of the Ladies.
The second services of the series in connection with the anniversary of the Colborne Street Methodist Church were given yesterday. The Ladies' Aid had charge of the day's proceedings. The Steamer Lulu Beatrice Ashore.

Steamer Rosedale Stranded Off Kingston—Great Gale on Lake Erie.

Port Stanley, Ont., Dec. 6.—The steamer Lulu Beatrice (Capt. Peter Hagblom), of Port Burwell, missed the harbor at an early hour yesterday morning, and went ashore east of the piers. The crew are safe, and were taken off by the lifeboat. The vessel lies on an even keel in about three feet of water, and is taking no harm, and it is hoped she will get off as soon as the sea runs down. She has some 300 barrels of salt on board, but as she is not leaking, it is likely to be landed without damage.

STRANDED OFF KINGSTON.
Kingston, Ont., Dec. 6.—Early yesterday morning the Donnelly Wrecking Company was summoned to the rescue of the steamer Rosedale, which had grounded on Charity Shoals, about 15 miles from here. There was a big sea on. The tug Walker came back at 2 p.m., finding it impossible to get near her. The crew are still on board.

A GREAT GALE.
Port Colborne, Ont., Dec. 6.—The heaviest gale of the season started blowing early yesterday morning from the southwest to south, raising the water to a level with the harbor stone wall, three or four feet above its usual height.

YANTIC WIND-BOUND.
Thorold, Ont., Dec. 6.—The United States steamer Yantic laid in the canal here all Sunday. She has two tugs helping her through. It is expected she will reach Detroit about Tuesday or Wednesday.
