London, Sept 25 .- The much canvassed report that Lord Rosebery contemplates a visit to Canada the year is denied by the ex-Premier himself, who, however, states that he is considering a trip to the Dominion in 1896. READY TO PAY JAPAN.

London, Sept. 25 .- It is stated that 30,000,000 taels in silver has been deposited at Shanghai by the Chinese Government, with which to pay the supplementary indemnity required by Japan as a consideration for the evacuation of the Liao Tung peninsula.

FRENCH SOLDIERS DYING FAST. Toulon, Sept. 25.—Dispatches received here from Madagascar state that all the provisions of the French expeditionary force which were stored at Mojunga have been spoiled by high tides. It is also reported that French soldiers rate of 30 to 40 a day.

RUSSIAN NAVAL MOVEMENTS. Odessa says the ships of the Russian Black Sea squadron have returned from Sebastopol, having finished their autumn maneuvers. The ships have sea service, and it is supposed that it is the intention to have them engage

REDUCING THE REGULAR ARMY. Paris, Sept. 25.-At the meeting of sands. the French budget committee today M. Cavaignac read a report proposing a reduction of 24,000,000 francs in the war budget. Gen. Zurlinden, the Minister of War, agreed to a reduction of 8,-000,000 francs. M. Cavaignae also proposed a reduction of the nineteenth army corps and the creation of a co-

lonial army. PALACE OF THE POPES London, Sept. 25 .- The Daily News publishes a dispatch from Paris saying that the town council of Avignon, acting upon a suggestion of Deputy Pourquery de Boisserin, who is mayor of the city, has voted carte blanche for the restoration of the historical Palace of the Popes, which has long been used

It is estimated that the work of restoration will cost 4,250,000 francs. It is proposed to convert the palace into a "Museum of Christendom." A prominent resident of the city declares that the Sacred College will elect the next Pope from Avignon, where he

will reside.

BOUND TO CRUSH CUBA. Madrid, Sept. 25 .- The Government has decided to hereafter send only veterans to Cuba for the suppression of the insurrection there. from Havana report several slight skirmisnes between Spanish and insurrectionary forces, and the appearance of Gen. Gomez, the Cuban leader, in the the Province of Santa Clara, Vibal, of the coasting steamer Mortera, which sunk the cruiser Barcastegui in a collision in the entrance to the harbor of Havana on the night of Sept. 18, and who is to undergo trial by court martial on the charge of culpable carelessness, has been ordered to find bail in the sum of 500,000 pesetas.

THE HATED FOREIGNERS London, Sept. 25.—A dispatch from Shanghai says that the entire province of Che Kiang has again been placarded with anti-foreign and anti-Christian proclamations, causing much anxiety among the foreign residents.

It is reported there that China has refused to grant the demand of Great Britain for the banishment of the late Viceroy of the Province of See-Chuen, who is accused of having instigated the outrages on the missionaries. An imperial decree has been issued pointing Li Hung Chang and all the members of the Tsung Li Yamen a commission to formulate an additional treaty between China and Japan.

A TURONTO POLICEMAN KILLED. A Verdict of Suicide-Friends Claim He

Was Murdered. Toronto, Ont., Sept. 25 .- Police Constable William Leonard was found dead in a lane between McCaul and Henry streets at 6:45 yesterday morning with a bullet wound through his head. His own revolver, which was for 2,000 thieves, to work on coffee plantathe regulation police weapon, lay be- tions, tween his knees, and an empty chamber showed that the bullet which brought death to the officer had been discharged from it. A coroner's jury last evening returned a verdict of sui-

Although the evidence adduced at the inquest apparently left no alternative to the jury, the members of the police force, and those who knew deceased best, refuse to a man to accept the theory of suicide, and declare their

belief even that their comrade has been foully murdered. Leonard was a pecu-liarly likeable fellow, good-hearted, genial and of buoyant spirits. He was married, and leaves a widow and two bright baby boys, to whom he was de-votedly attached. He owned the house he lived in, and had a few hundred dol-lars laid by for a rainy day. It is known that he was in the best of spirits French Soldiers Cannot Stand within an hour of his death, and had even made appointments with at least two friends to meet them yesterday.

The generally expressed opinion among the men on the force is that Leonard followed a suspicious charac-ter into the dark lane, drawing his revolver as he went, that he was seized unawares in the dark, and not being a strong man his gun was turned against him while still in his own hand and the trigger pressed.
