Postmaster Brown, Priceville, Grey county is dead, aged 68. He was a Scotchman by birth, and was one time a merchant in Durham.

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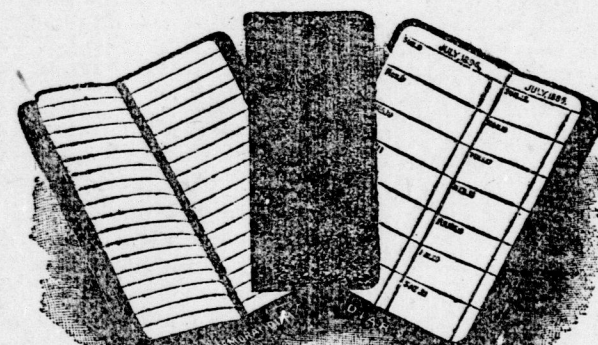
