1861—Elizabeth Barrett Browning, English poetess, died, born 1806.

1868—Halo-in-the-Day, Chippewa chief and the richest Indian in North America, assassinated by Indians of the conservative party; born about 1827; he married an Irish woman, promoted the arts of peace and acquired about \$2,000,000.

1876—Americans won in the great contest between American and Irish rifle teams.

1898—Francis Henry Temple Bell, the artist, died; born 1827. General Washington L. Elliott died in San Francisco; born 1851.

1891—An inland lake appeared in the Colorado desert.

1892—John W. Foster of Indiana appointed secretary of state to succeed Blaine.

—The drum corps of the Liberal fleet are asked to meet to-night in the Simcoe street rink.

—Mr. Robert Piper, of Fort William, is visiting his uncle, Ald. Stevely, King street.

—Mrs. C. W. Norman and two sons leave Friday on a visit to Mrs. C. E. Stanton, 63 Fillmore avenue, Buffalo.

—Mr. J. T. Burgess is home again from the Northwest and British Columbia, and will be calling on his friends for a few days.

—Mr. Frank Moore, of the firm of Doherty & Moore, merchant tailors, leaves shortly for Colorado for his health's benefit. The store has closed up.

—The fine band of the Thirtieth Battalion will play at Dr. Eccles' grounds to-night. The young son of the able leader, Lowry, is bugler, and in his 13th year.

—J. D. Dickson, B.A., of Brockville, has been appointed principal of the new Niagara Falls High School, with Miss E. S. Fitzgerald, of London, as first assistant.

—The noted young Scotch dancers, the Misses Shand, go to Orangeville on Dominion Day, where they will give an exhibition. Piper Angus accompanies them.

—At the regular meeting of Eden Lodge, No. 6, G. R. O., held last evening at the Freemasons' Hall, Huron and Erie buildings, the following officers were installed by the worshipful past master: W. M., Bro. W. Farmer (re-elected); S. W., R. Fraser; J. W., R. Whitton; Treas., C. Needham; Sec., F. Parker; S. D., F. Westlake; J. D., Thos. Wedderburn; J. S., J. E. Malone; Tyler, W. H. Holmes. At the close of lodge business an adjournment was had to the Richmond House, where lunch was provided and a social hour spent.

—The sprightly monthly "Onward," referring to the Toronto Methodist Conference, has this to say of the first appearance in it of a talented former Son of London: The generous recognition of talent anywhere, even in its youngest members, is a marked feature of the conference. Mr. N. W. Rowell, a lay delegate, who is barely of the legal age to entitle him to Conference membership, gave an able address on the transfer question, and one on the Epworth League and its opportunities, which placed him at once in the forefront of the debaters, and elicited hearty congratulations from even those opposed to his views.

No. 3 Committee. At last evening's meeting of No. 3 Committee, there were present Ald. Fitzgerald (chairman), Ald. James, J. W. Jones, Stevely and Scarrow and Mayor Essery. The petition of Rev. W. T. Hill, for an electric light at the corner of George and Grosvenor streets, was laid over. George Taylor asked to be allowed to cover with sheet iron the frame part of a small addition at rear of 181 Dundas street, Bomer's confectionery. The committee decided not to interfere in the matter. Mr. Bomer has been summoned by the engineer. The engineer and Chief Roe were requested to consult together and recommend to the committee any suggestions or improvements they deem advisable to the fire limits bylaw. The bylaw for reserving the lane and veranda east of Covent Garden market house for the exclusive use of the tenants of the market building for their rig was ordered to be submitted to the council for adoption. Contractor Beckett called the attention of the committee to the fact that hydrants at the Bernard House, Hodgins House and City Hotel were buried with rigs, and it was possible for him to water that section unless he had easy access to hydrants. Chief Roe also said there was great danger in case of fire; it would cause delay. Unlabeled hotel-keepers keep hydrants clear the privies, etc., to stand at hotels will be taken from them.
