parts adjacent again recommended a division of the parish. Rev. Canon Davis, as rural dean, brought forward a scheme for the reorganization of several parishes in the county. A protest was read from the parishes of Berville and Gorrie against proposed reorganization.

The report of the bishop's commissioner to the synod was read, and the congregation be attached to the parish of the Memorial Church. Report adopted.

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On motion it was agreed that the report be adopted, so far as the assessment is concerned, and that a commissioner be appointed to visit the parish of Ailsa Craig, Brinsley and McGillivray, with a view to reorganization.

Applications were received from several places in Grey and Bruce for reorganization, and it was agreed to recommend the bishop to appoint a commissioner to visit the places interested and to report.

Land and investment—The committee reported the investments are satisfactory. Report adopted.

Income and expenditure—The committee reported that Rev. Mr. Roy had resumed the canvass of the diocese after his holidays, the amounts collected since last meeting, so far as reported, being \$3875.

The committee on the financial system of the synod reported progress.

The committee on Young People's Societies stated that considerable progress had been made, and a circular will shortly be sent out, giving details of the proposed scheme.

Dr. W. H. Moorhouse, B.A., was reappointed examining physician for the synod.

The reports of the several clergymen on the superannuation list were then read, accompanied by the physician's certificate.

After several other matters had been disposed of the committee adjourned.

**VERY LITTLE MONEY LEFT**  
Engineer Cautions No. 2 To Be Careful With Funds.

Repair of West London Breakwater Caused Overdraft of \$500.

Engineer Graydon reported at last night's meeting of the board of works that the funds of No. 2 committee were so low that it would be impossible to do any more work this year, beyond the necessary repairing. The breakwater in West London would make an overdraft of about \$500, so that the remaining funds would only be sufficient to provide for the foremen's wages, and any snowplowing expenses that may arise before the first of the year. The letter was filed.

The engineer also reported that the bridge crossing over Carling's Creek on English street opened in about a week ago, and that the street had to be closed to traffic. He said it would be necessary to either construct a new timber bridge or replace the old one with a 43-inch concrete tile drain.

His recommendation was that only 20 feet of tile, sufficient for a roadway, be laid this year, the remainder, some 86 feet, to be laid next year.

The matter was disposed of by a motion that a concrete tile drain be put down from the sidewalk on the west side to the ditch on the east side.

A humorously-sarcastic missive from Mr. Cy Warman, the well-known story writer, complained of a patience-tiring stretch of walk on E. 4-7-23 street, which Mr. Warman alleges is unfit for pedestrians or any other purposes.

A new walk will be advertised on the initiative.

The petitions of C. E. L. Pratt, for a sewer on St. George street, between Central avenue and Hyman street, and of Alex. Anderson, for a sewer on Charlotte street, from Dundas street, to a point opposite the south side of Lorne avenue, were ordered to be advertised on the initiative, as was that of John S. Walker for a five-foot cement walk on the south side of Maple street, between Richmond and Talbot streets.

Warren Bros. & Co., who have the contract for the Talbot and Peter street pavements, asked for an extension of time owing to the unfavorable weather experienced since starting work. They asked that the time for completing the Talbot street pavement be extended to Oct. 15, and that of Peter street till Oct. 30. Their request was granted.

The matter of W. H. Bartram's proposed indictment against the city was laid over, as were several matters of unimportant nature.

A sewer on High street, which was repaired a short time ago, nevertheless backed up and flooded the cellars of Messrs. Smith and Bradshaw. They appeared before the board and protested vigorously against the nuisance. A motion was passed providing for a larger tile being put in place of the old one.
