RACE TRACKS PAID \$200,000 TO STATE

The state racing commission, composed of August Belmont, E. D. Morgan and John Sanford, has submitted its eighth annual report to the Legis-

lature of the State of New York. It is pointed out in this report that the year 1903, in racing, exceeded in prosperity all previous years.

The state tax paid to the Agricultural

tural Society amounted to \$200,741, which was in excess of that paid in 1902 by more than \$30,000. The public patronage of racetracks exceeded that of 1902 by \$613,115. Last year there was paid out to owners of horses in this state \$2,165,487, which is \$316,798 more than was distributed in premiums in 1902. In all, continues the report, in this state last year there were 1,322 races, and in them 1,572 different horses participated. There were 50 stake races in excess of \$5,000 value each to the winner, 100 in excess of \$2,000, and 100 in excess of \$1,000.

In 1903, apart from the sales of yearlings made by private agreement, and apart from the market which obtains in Kentucky, statistics as nearly correct as may be had show that 1,007 yearlings were sold at public auction in New York and in Chicago for a gross total of \$925,765. Of these 1,007 no fewer than 884 were sold in this state, and for them \$881,150, or an average of nearly \$993 each, was obtained.

Last year he played on the Vincennes team, of Vincennes, Ind., and at times displayed traces of his old-time speed, but near the end of the season he became very slow and was of little service to the team. Rusie is now employed by a lumber dealer in Vincennes, and often laments the loss of his power as a pitcher.
