THOUSANDS CROWD TO WINTER FAIR

Another Big Day for the Guelph Stock Show.

THE SHEEP-BREEDERS ELECT

Premier Whitney Visits the Fair—List of Prizewinners in Cattle, Sheep and Swine.

Guelph, Dec. 12.—The city was crowded with visitors to the Winter Fair last night, and today sees a heavy influx of breeders, members of various organizations, and a couple of hundred members of the fair sex, who are here to attend the annual convention of the Women's Institute. Yesterday one could walk around and inspect comfortably—today the crush is so great as to render this impossible. Almost all the judging is now completed. The poultry inspection finished yesterday afternoon and the various colored ribbons were awarded.

Meetings of breeders are taking place. That of the American Leicester sheep men was the first, and the report of the secretary-treasurer, A. J. Temple, showed total receipts of \$677.75, and disbursements amounting to \$646.50, leaving a balance of \$31.25. The board of directors recommended they affiliate with the Canadian National Record Association, if satisfactory arrangements can be made in the interests of the association. This was finally withdrawn, and the matter left in the hands of the directors. The election of officers resulted as follows: President—J. M. To Meet in Toronto.
The executive of the Dominion Short-horn Breeders' Association met, President W. G. Pettit, of Freeman, in the chair. The auditors' report showed the association to be financially healthy and otherwise. The date for the annual meeting was fixed for the sixth day of February in Toronto.

Bright and early this morning killing commenced, bacon hogs being the first to come to the butchers' knives. There will be followed this afternoon by the cattle, after which the dressed carcasses will be judged. The convention of Women's Institutes commenced business this morning at Macdonald Institute. Professor Day, of the O. A. C., summarized the points brought out, and Robert Miller, Stouffville, led in the discussion.
