The superintendent will have general supervision over all classes of provincial high, public and separate schools, art schools, public libraries and all inspectors. He may make recommendations to the minister on any matter arising out of this supervision.

The advisory council will consist of seventeen members, fifteen being elective each. Two members will repres sent high school teachers, one the ter may, as he thinks best, accept or reject the advice of the advisor

council. The high school grants will be made as heretofore, except that no account (Continued on Page Eight.)
