SAYS CANADIAN CITIES AHEAD OF AMERICAN

Senior Magistrate of Glasgow Declares Are Better Regulated.

New York, Aug. 18.—Mr. James Shaw Maxwell, senior magistrate of the city of Glasgow, who is making an extensive tour of the United States and Canada, arrived in New York yesterday. Although Mr. Maxwell's purpose in visiting America is for the transaction of private business, he is taking advantage of the opportunity to study public institutions. He declares he has been greatly impressed with those he has already visited in Chicago, Boston, Toronto and Ottawa.

Coming as he does from the birthplace of municipal ownership, Mr. Maxwell professes surprise that the citizens of the large municipalities are not more interested in that problem. "From what I have already observed," he says, "the Canadian cities are far ahead of those in the United States in many respects. They appear to be better regulated and are kept cleaner."

In referring to yesterday's fire in Glasgow, the visitor expressed the opinion that New York was in more danger from serious conflagrations than his home city. "We have no frame buildings in the city proper," he said, "and I believe that our fire regulations are more strictly observed."

OFFENDERS FELL OUT

Rainy River Guide Quarrelled With Patrons and Is Sentenced.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—The Ontario Game and Fisheries Department netted the sum of \$150 in fines, and a Rainy River guide will serve three months imprisonment and probably lose his license as a result of a dispute between a party of wealthy American tourists and James McAuley, a guide, over the settlement of the latter's wages.

As a result of the difference, which is reported to have reached an acrimonious and belittling status, McAuley laid an information against Wm. Guthrie, attorney of Kansas City, and Edward Pearson, manufacturer of St. Paul, charging them with shooting a moose out of season. They appeared before Police Magistrate Charles J. Hollands of Port Frances, pleaded guilty and were fined respectively \$100 and \$50 and costs.

Immediately thereafter Mr. Guthrie swore out an information against the guide for aiding and abetting the offense, the evidence going to show that McAuley urged the tourists to shoot, as "everybody did it," furnished and loaded the rifle for Guthrie and supplied the ammunition.

The magistrate fined the guide \$100 and costs or three months imprisonment, the latter penalty being incurred. He has also reported the facts to the department, and McAuley will probably lose his license.

W. Monga, a Galician, was also fined \$10 and costs for having partake in his possession out of season.

DOCKED A WEEK.

Detroit, Aug. 18.—The steamer Mapleton, owned by the Matthews Steamship Company, of Toronto is in the drydock at the Ecorse Plant of the Great Lakes Engineering Works. She was ashore near Detroit recently and her forward compartment was full of water when she arrived here. Eight plates will be removed and the boat will likely be in the dock about a week.

ARKANSAS IN FLOOD

Cloudbursts in the Rockies Do Immense Damage.

Pueblo, Col., Aug. 18.—Cloudbursts last night at Howard and in Ute Pass made raging torrents of tributaries of the Arkansas River, causing the worst flood in years along the main stream. At Canon City, the Arkansas River was 5 feet higher than ever before in its history at midnight and still rising. This flood is due here some time today, and preparations were made to avoid the great damage.

At Florence the entire population worked through the entire night, carrying goods to higher ground, with the expectation that practically the entire town would be submerged. The extent of the damage at Howard has not been learned as communication has been cut off by the storm. Horsemen were sent out last night all along the river between Canon City and Pueblo, and even below here, to warn the people of the approaching flood.

TO VISIT NEW LAND

Russian Party to Study Colonization Methods in Ontario.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—A distinguished party of representative visitors, including Prince George Lovoff, President of the Organization des Zemstvos Russes Unis; M. Tihan Polner, his secretary, and M. P. Van Kessel Renard, secretary of the Russian consulate in Canada, were at the Provincial Parliament buildings yesterday to investigate colonization conditions in Ontario.

The Russian nobleman, whose conversation in English is carried on by means of his secretary, who acts as interpreter, intimated that his mission was to study at first hand the possibilities for satisfactory and successful settlement which are offering in Northern Ontario, and learn the plans of Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of lands, forests and mines, as to prospective opening up and development of the country.

The prince and his staff spent considerable time in the colonization branch gathering information, and the nobleman expressed the desire to learn in detail the plan adopted by the minister of mines in surveying the newly-opened up country in the north. Today he is visiting the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph, whence he will return to make an extended tour of Northern Ontario. He declined to tell the officials of the colonization branch the character of his visit and his plans, but it is probable that he will confer with the minister concerning them on his return.

STRIKEBREAKER SHOOT.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 18.—One man was shot in the right leg, and several others slightly injured by stones during a small riot today in the vicinity of the Pressed Steel Car Company's works at McKees Rocks, where a strike has been in progress for six weeks.

The trouble occurred when fifty strikers attempted to prevent a strikebreaker from entering the plant. When hard pressed the man fired three shots into the crowd of strikers, one bullet taking effect in the leg of Barney Waters, a bystander.

Shooting and stone-throwing were freely indulged in until the arrival of twenty minutes later, of the constabulary, when the strikers were dispersed.

WARLIKE ALFONSO.

Madrid, Aug. 18.—King Alfonso is taking the keenest interest in the war in Morocco, and all of Premier Maura's influence is required to prevent him from going to the front. His majesty writes daily to officers at Melilla when he knows personally. Neither King Alfonso nor any member of the royal household has participated in any entertainments or rejoicings since the war has been in progress, and the social life of Madrid is almost at a standstill.

HAMILTON MAN WINS AT LONG BRANCH

Londoners Well Up in Big Tourney—Yesterday's Scores.

Long Branch, Aug. 17.—Pte. P. Armstrong, of the Thirteenth Regiment, Hamilton, carried off the high individual prize in the Canadian Club match at the ranges today in the opening event of the annual Ontario Rifle Association meet. The team prize was won by the Governor-General's Foot Guards. Over 300 marksmen competed.

A strong wind and cold damp atmosphere made things disagreeable for the marksmen with the result that the scores averaged unusually low.

She was met at the door by Willoughby, with a cup of water in his hand, and gasping. He motioned her to go in, and she did so, while he remained in the yard.

On entering the sitting-room she was horrified to find the body of the dead girl, and asked Harry what had happened.

"Father got too big a charge in, and killed Stella," he is reported to have replied.

The frightened woman, after making sure that the girl was dead, ran out to Willoughby and said to him: "What shall we do?"

He replied: "Run for a doctor as quick as you can."

Mrs. Rutten lost no time in going for help, and when she returned to Mrs. Willoughby that her daughter had been badly hurt. She immediately drove home and found a number of men outside, who had hesitated to enter. They tried to stop her, but she broke away from them, rushing into the sitting-room to find her daughter dead on the lounge and close beside her on the floor the lifeless form of her husband.

CHOKED HIS WIFE IN POLICE COURT

Stratford, Aug. 18.—An habitual notorious drunkard, Jack Court by name, appeared before the police magistrate yesterday morning on a charge of using violence towards his wife, Mrs. Court, who is a respectable woman, was in the witness box giving evidence against him, when her husband sprang from the prisoner's box and attempted to choke her to death. QUESTIONS OF THE MAXIMUM RATES

Canadian Commissioners Will Defer Visit to the West Indies.

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—The Ministers of Finance and Customs who have been appointed on the royal commission to inquire into trade between the British West Indies and other parts of the empire will not likely proceed upon their mission until the winter season is well advanced. There is reason for this other than considerations of climate. It will not be known before March 1 just what countries and commodities are to be placed under the application of the maximum tariff of the United States, and it is important that the application of this tariff should be made before new tariff arrangements are entered into by Canada with countries from which the United States imports largely. U. S. COAL TARIFF HELPS NOVA SCOTIA

Certain to Increase the Shipments Into United States of Bituminous.

New York, Aug. 18.—The first effect of the reduction of 22 cents a ton in the tariff on bituminous coals will be to increase shipments from the mines in Nova Scotia. In discussing this phase of the situation, Black Diamond, the official organ of the trade, says: "It is, of course, too early to discuss, with intelligence the possible or probable influence of tariff rates on coal upon the market in any particular section. It may be expected, however, that the first influence of the reduction of 22 cents a ton in the tariff on bituminous coal will find its most important expression in New England and on the Pacific coast."

"The influence will naturally take the form of increased shipments from the mines in Nova Scotia, but inasmuch as they are now bothered by labor troubles increased shipments from that territory need not be expected soon."

"If ultimately there is any displacement of Pennsylvania and West Virginia coals in New England markets that buy coal from Nova Scotia, it may be expected that producing companies in the former fields will have to market their additional surplus in the rail market of the west."
