Spelling "B" of Old-Fashioned Type

Lorne Avenue Pupils Won Out in One Against Combined Forces of Chesley Avenue and Rectory Street.

An old-fashioned spelling match was the feature of an entertainment in Lorne Avenue Public School yesterday afternoon. It was conducted by Principal James Kirkwood of Empress Avenue School, and the opposing teams were pupils from Lorne Avenue and Chesley Avenue and Rectory Street Schools combined. It was won by Lorne Avenue.

The match started with 25 on a side, but such words as "aqueous," "emancipator," "insatiable" and "javelin" reduced the sides to eight for Lorne Avenue and seven for Rectory and Chesley. Of this fifteen, ten were girls and five were boys. A few more "hardones" and the sides stood six to four with only one boy. He appeared to be holding his own, while his side dwindled down to two, one boy and one girl, against six girls on the Lorne Avenue side, but he went down shortly, leaving five girls for Lorne Avenue and one girl, Ruby Parker, of Rectory Street, on the union team. Ruby spelled "rheumatism" correctly, and the opposing side was reduced to three. Grace Norton, Marjorie Taylor and Rhea McRoberts. The next "sticker" was "nauseous," and here was where Ruby failed, and the hopes of Rectory and Chesley flickered out at last, but two others from the Lorne Avenue team went down almost simultaneously, leaving Rhea McRoberts alone on the floor, the word that tripped up the last of her companions being "acquiescence." She received a prize of a book.

The program included a solo by Miss G. Shortill, a recitation by V. Perry, a song by Mrs. Riach, a recitation by Miss K. Braithwaite, a duet by Mr. and Mrs. Eby, and a song by Teddy Williamson. The entertainment was in aid of a fund to provide pictures for the schoolrooms.

THIRTY DAYS JAIL FOR "INDUSTRIAL WORKER"

PROTESTING AGAINST PROPOSED ANNEXATION

People of Yukon Demand a Plebiscite Before Any Exchange Is Made.

Dawson City, Y. T., March 6.—Strong opposition to the proposed annexation of the Yukon to British Columbia, developed at an immense mass meeting held here last night under the auspices of the Yukon Territorial Liberal Association, which filled Arctic Brotherhood Hall. Fred T. Congdon, K.C., formerly member of Parliament, in protesting against annexation, objected to giving a route to an American railway from Haines, unless the Yukon could secure the whole of the Alaskan Panhandle in exchange for a string of Canadian territory from Haines north, which he believed might yet prove of enormous value. He claimed that British principles would be violated if Canadian territory was exchanged without the consent of citizens occupying that territory, since they would be deprived of the Canadian right of self-government. It would never do to attempt to carry out the suggestion without a plebiscite being taken in the Yukon. Apart from this attitude, all parties in the country are against annexation. The press is unanimously of the opinion that the change would be disastrous.

THINKS HE HAS FOUND TINTORETTO PAINTING

Parisian Discovers Picture in Storehouse and Says It Is an Old Master.

Paris, March 6.—City Councillor Adrien Mithouard, while inspecting a storehouse where old pictures and bric-a-brac were kept, yesterday found a dusty canvas which he declared was by Tintoretto, a celebrated Venetian painter. The staff of the storehouse was skeptical, but Mithouard insisted that it was "The Adoration of the Shepherds," which according to tradition, once hung in the old church at Auteuil. The picture will be submitted to experts.
