

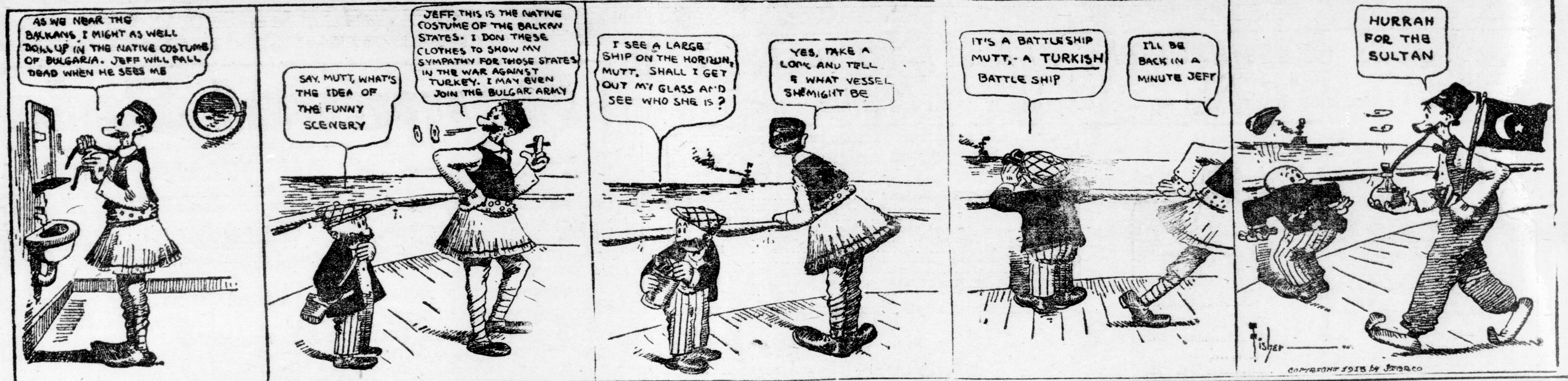

LONDON LOSES TO PARIS IN HARD-FOUGHT GAME

Long, Narrow Rink in Underwear Town Seemed to Interfere
With Indians' Combination—Game Was Rough, and a
Couple of Local Players Were Badly Used Up.

Paris, Jan. 28.—Paris handed London a trifle the worst of tonight's O. H. A. fixture, the locals winning by a score of 8 to 3. One of the largest crowds that ever witnessed a hockey game in this town packed the rink and filled every available space except the ice surface. The London club arrived about 8 o'clock on a special train, accompanied by about four hundred rovers, but the Forest City crowd was given little opportunity to root after the first ten minutes of the game. The half-time score was 5 to 2.

A Hard-Fought Game. It was probably the hardest-fought game that London and Paris ever played, and that the green-sweated aggregation handed London the worst beating that a team from that city was ever handed on Paris ice, makes the outlook bright for the district honours coming to a finish. The game was rough from start to finish, and Referee Whitehead, a Toronto official, appeared utterly incapable of handling the play at times. He allowed almost everything but actual killing, and even the local fans were disgusted with his work. Both teams indulged in tripping, body-checking, and dirty tactics, and it was hard to say which team offended the most. London suffered more penalties than the home team, but there were many more penalties which should have been inflicted on both sides. In the second half Borland and Walden were laid out as a result of being body-checked, the former lighting on his head and being carried from the ice in an unconscious condition. He revived and came back into the game again after ten minutes. Walden was only temporarily dazed. A Paris man was penalized for these offences. At times Referee Whitehead appeared to be indifferent to the game, and the players could have engaged in open combat as far as he seemed to care. The O. H. A. should pick its referees more carefully in future.

Walden's Work a Feature. For the visitors, Walden, Grannary, and McAvoy worked the hardest. Walden played the game of his life in the last half, and he was checking two and three men at a time, taking them away from them and rushing it to the other end of the rink. Even the Paris crowd admitted he was some player, and Paris seldom admits anything when it comes to discussing the abilities of a visiting aggregation. Grannary's brilliant rushes the whole length of the rink resulted in two of London's goals, the big coverpoint taking the puck through the wide Parisian goal for the first goal of the game. In the second half he was responsible for London's third and last goal, passing the puck to Walden after running through the whole Paris team.

McAvoy Effective. McAvoy worked hard all the way through, and he was the most effective man on the London team. His back-checking was a feature, but he was away off in his shooting, confining himself mostly to an individual game, which was about the only thing to do under the circumstances. For Paris the whole seven players played the games of their lives. At times they outdistanced London, and they back-checked like demons. They knew every trick of the round corners. They simply out-tricked London at all stages, and though they were lighter than their opponents, they used their light weight most effectively.

The Game. London started off with a rush, and the play was pretty much at the Paris end. Repeated attacks on the Paris goal were

LOCAL RINKS OUT OF DISTRICT CUP

Forest and St. Thomas Battle in the Finals at London Club Rink—Ingersoll and Sarnia Lose.

Upon the conclusion of play last night the rinks from the Forest and St. Thomas curling clubs were left to battle for the possession of the district cup, and the final game was played this morning, commencing at 10 o'clock. This is the second successive year that Forest has been in the finals, and last year the two rinks from that place were successful in winning the cup.

The representatives of the London and Thistle clubs were put out of the running in the first round by Ingersoll and St. Thomas, respectively, and on account of the defeat of the locals, there was not as much interest taken in the games as would have been the case if the local clubs had made more progress toward the finals. As it was, the game between Forest and Ingersoll was watched by a fairly large gallery, until the last stone was put down a few minutes before midnight. The ice was in better condition than at any previous time this season, and there were some fine demonstrations of the Scotch game, particularly during the evening match.

SEAFORTH'S PROTEST THROWN OUT BY O. H. A.

Hamilton-Niagara Falls' Game Will Be Played Over Again in Hamilton.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—A meeting of the O. H. A. sub-committee yesterday afternoon to consider three protests. Dwight J. Turner occupied the chair, and Francis Nelson and W. A. Hewitt were also present.

The Seaforth club protested the Goderich game of 21st at Seaforth on the ground that the first goal of the match had been scored after the penalty bell had rung, though the referee did not ring his bell until the score had been made. The referee's decision is final on question of fact.

Niagara Falls Tecumsehs and Hamilton had a dispute over the game at Hamilton on the 23rd, when by a mistake there remained 4½ minutes of playing time. The Tecumsehs left the ice under the impression that the game had been finished, and they were ahead, 8 goals to 5. The Hamilton team went back on the ice with the referee and scored 4 goals giving them the game by 9 to 8.

The committee decided the game void and ordered it to be replayed in Hamilton if it should have any bearing on the group championship. Niagara Falls will get their mileage and half the gate receipts.
In the dispute between Elmira and Berlin Intermediates, it was found that Berlin had entered into an agreement for local referees, which should have been adhered to. Though no ground was found for interfering with the result of the game as played, the committee deducted from Berlin's deposit the amount of the amount over to charity, as all that was sought by Elmira was justification of their stand. The objection to William Uffelman, of Berlin, under the residence clause, was not pressed.
Charles Langman, who went out with the Hamilton Alerts, made a statement of his age, and asked for reinstatement, but no action was taken.
