Long, Narrow Rink in Underwear Town Seemed to Interfere With Indians' Combination—Game Was Rough, and a Couple of Local Players Were Badly Used Up.

Paris, Jan. 28.—Paris handed London a trifle the worst of tonight's O. H. A. fixture, the locals winning by a score of 8 to 3. One of the largest crowds that ever witnessed a hockey game in this town packed the rink and filled every available space except the ice surface.
