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Cultivate Waste Lands To Relieve Unemployment

Ottawa, Aug 30.—Canadian Press.—The Dominion Command, Great War Veterans, has received the outline of a plan whereby the waste lands in the vicinity of every large city could be utilized and at the same time give employment to many of the unemployed.

The scheme as outlined provides for the formation of a corporation to be known as the Corporation for Unemployment, with shares at \$1 each, to be contributed by any person interested. This money, the plan sets forth, would purchase the land, while the produce sold at regular market prices would pay wages and other charges.

If this scheme were in operation, the inventor believes, every unemployed man could be given work while waiting for an opening in his proper trade.

Violent Fighting Is Resumed In Belfast; 3 Killed, Many Hurt

Citizens Place Sand Bags in Thoroughfares and Open Fire On Police and Military-Dail Eireann's Reply to Lloyd George's Latest Communication Will Be Delivered This Evening to British Premier.

Belfast, Aug. 30.—Street fighting, which has been in progress since yesterday became particularly violent after 1 o'clock today, the dinner hour at ninety factories in the side streets radiating from Duncairn Gardens and north Queen's street. One laborer was shot dead and several other persons were wounded, including one army sergeant. Citizens placed sandbags in the middle of the streets and maintained heavy firing against the police and military, who were forced to abandon the streets. Armored cars were summoned. At one time the patter of bullets resembled a halistorm.

Last night's rioting, when two persons were killed and several injured, was the most serious the country has experienced for some time. The police and military were engaged throughout the night in subduing gunmen and sompers who were operating from windows and roofs, and who continued their fusillade until after midnight. Street lamps were extinguished and theory in the mob had set fire.

The rioting continued throughout the afternoon and resulted in the death of two more persons. William Kennedy was shot dead. Forty-eight persons wounded in the rioting were taken to hospitals.
