Correspondence Relative To Manning Doherty's Trip To England Tabled.

Premier King Brings Down File At London Member's Request.

OTTAWA, May 2 .- (By Canadian Press,) — Correspondence which passed during the year 1921 between the prime minister of Canada and the premier of Ontario, relating to the activities in England of Hon. Manning Doherty, Ontario minister of agriculture, was tabled in the House of Commons today by the prime minister at the request of F. R. White (Conservative, London,

Two letters and a memorandum sent by Right Hon. Arthur Meighen were in the file which was tabled with a communication from Sir Joseph Pope, under-secretary of state for external affairs, in which it was stated that the department had no correspondence other than certain papers left by the secretary of the ate prime minister at the change

On Jan. 6, Premier Drury wrote from Toronto to Premier Meighen referring to the "propaganda work" of Hon. Manning Doherty, in England the previous fall, which, he said "was designed to stir up the British people on the subject of the removal

of the cattle embargo."

"The matter, I am well aware, is well beyond the sphere of the pro-vincial government," Mr. Drury's letter continued, "but the propaganda work done by Mr. Doherty has had an enormous effect on public opinion in England, and seems likely to bear some fruit. I know you are thoroughly aware of the immense importance to Canada at large and to the farmers and stockmen of Canada in farmers and stockmen of Canada in particular, of having this embargo removed, and I would suggest that your government seize the opportunity when public opinion in England is so thoroughly aroused on the subject to make strong official representations through the proper channels that action be taken in this resentations through the proper chan-nels that action be taken in this re-

Meighen's Reply Read.

The other letter was from Premier Meighen to Premier Drury, under date of Jan. 15, 1921. In it Mr. Meighen said:

"I have followed personally the efforts made in recent years by, and on behalf of, the Government of Canada to secure removal of the embargo against Canadian cattle. It seems to me scarcely a proper function on our part to initiate or engage in propaganda work among the British people in opposition to the course pursued by the British Government.

"Similar activity in Canada on the part of the British authorities would, fear, be universally resented here. think you will agree from the memorandum inclosed that there has been no proper step omitted by the Government of Canada which could reasonably have been taken to secure the removal of the embargo. The same course which we have pursued we proposed to continue and as noted in the memorandum the strongest pressure will again be

brought to bear."

The memorandum accompanying Right Hon. Mr. Meighen's letter to Premier Drury covered the history of the case prior to the representa-tions made by Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues in 1917, and subsequent efforts in 1919 and 1920. In ing on Mr. Doherty's visi the memorandum stated:

actual effect of Mr. Doherty's visit to England upon the movements of the odies whose influence really counts has been negligible. If Canada is to secure generous consideration from Great Britain in this regard it can never be on the basis of 'demand' or in respect of charges of bad faith, which the British Government will quite properly resent, but rather in consideration of actual economic need, and in the face of conditions which will clearly indicate the mutual advantage to either country.

"The Federal Government is in the best position it has ever been at the present moment to carry through the negotiations with success, and it will be a pity if it is to be embarrassed by demands from irresponsible quarters in Canada, when it ought to re-ceive the undivided and sympathetic support of all Canadian interests, it being a matter which should be above personal or political consideration and be recognized as of vital concern to the whole country.'
