Oil Riches Said To Await Eccentric Sisters Held For Cruelty To Animals

Experts Predict Fortune Would Be Found If Women Permit Drilling.

COMMITTED TO JAIL

Prisoners Will Be Tested For Sanity—Wear Sackcloth in Court.

Canadian Press Despatch. Chatham, Feb. 27.—There is a fortune for Luella and Mary Radmore, oilmen predicted today. If the eccentric sisters would permit oil drilling operations upon their 200-acre farm in Romney Township, where county police discovered them Monday, with their aged mother, living under deplorable conditions.

Located a short distance west of Port Alma, the farm is in the heart of the present Tilbury gas field. It is this territory in which oil-drilling experts predict there will be a big boom this summer. They declare that in the event of a boom the Radmore farm will be considerably increased in value. The present value is approximately \$30,000, and it is said that the sisters already have an income from four gas wells on their farm.

The sisters were today remanded to jail for a week on charges of cruelty to animals, and will be examined as to their sanity. Humane Society officials have taken charge of the farm stock, which was spared slaughter Tuesday when the women were apprehended. The aged mother has been placed in the public general hospital pending disposition of the charges against her daughters.

MOTHER AND CHILDREN OVERCOME WITH GAS

Kingston Man Rushes Home To Find Family Unconscious.

Canadian Press Despatch. Kingston, Feb. 27.—Mrs. Ernest J. Cobb and her three small children, two girls and a boy, had a miraculous escape from death yesterday, when they were all overcome by illuminating gas in their home. The family had noticed a slight smell of gas around the house, but had paid little or no attention to it until one of the children went fast asleep and could not be awakened. As Mrs. Cobb was giving attention another of the children toppled over. The mother became alarmed, and went to the telephone to call her husband. While she was telephoning she was overcome.

Mr. Cobb rushed to his home and found all the family unconscious.

DELORME IS TRIED IN OPEN LANEWAY

Court Does Its Best To Maintain Dignity Amid Snowbanks.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Feb. 27.—Open air court was held this afternoon, with Mr. Justice Martineau, the jury, lawyers, court officials and Father Adelard Delorme travelling in taxicabs to the little lane off Labelle street in the rear of the former Delorme home at 190 St. Hubert street.

The intention of the court was to procure physical evidence of the location at the back of the Delorme dwelling. When the string of taxicabs arrived the end of the lane was packed with people. Percy H. Atkins, former neighbor of Father Delorme, was cross-examined in the lane while a court stenographer did his best to write with fingers benumbed with cold. In the end the court was formally adjourned, the court order standing upon a snowbank to cry out the proper "Oyez, Oyez" and "God Save the King."

Father Delorme, who was well protected from the cold by a heavy racoon coat and a fur cap, was most active, showing his legal advisers what such and such a door led to, and what this and that window opened on.

Some curious incidents took place. At one time two cats, holy pursued by a foxterrier, dashed between the judge's legs and then upset a garbage can, raising a disturbance out of keeping with the dignity of the court. A woman who was in a hurry to open her window, smashed a milk bottle on the sill, and the fluid trickled down the wall.

The afternoon session was wholly occupied as to notice heard in the cellar and lane behind the Delorme house on the night of Jan. 6, 1922, when the murder was committed.

FORMER PROMOTER CHARGED WITH PIRACY

Boston Officers Holding Ray Cass For Nova Scotia Authorities.

Associated Press Despatch. Boston, Feb. 27.—Ray Cass of Somerville, former boxing promoter, arrested today on a charge of piracy and attempted murder, sworn out by the British consul-general here on behalf of Nova Scotia authorities, was held in jail tonight while a telegram was sent to the attorney-general of the Canadian province asking whether he will agree to Cass' release on bail. At a hearing before the U. S. commissioner, counsel for the Nova Scotia government urged that he be held without bail.

The charges against Cass both here and in Canada grew out of an attack last August on the British schooner J. Scott Hankerson, a run-runner, off Cape Ann. A band which boarded the vessel wounded the skipper and "cook," but failed to find money.

CONGRESS AID SOUGHT TO WIPE OUT DISEASE

Official Proposes \$1,000,000 Fund To Fight Foot-and-Mouth Malady.

Associated Press Despatch. Washington, Feb. 27.—Secretary Wallace has taken steps to obtain from Congress an appropriation of \$1,000,000 to eradicate the foot and mouth disease in California and in other places in the country where it may appear.

The money would be used in co-operation with the states in the fight against the disease.

VIOLENT EARTHQUAKE. Associated Press Despatch. Anchorage, Alaska, Feb. 27.—An earthquake, declared the most violent ever noticed here, occurred at 2:07 yesterday morning. This was the sixth earthquake recorded at Anchorage in six months. A few broken dishes was the only damage reported.

INQUEST OPENED INTO TRAIN WRECK

Coroner At Brockville Investigating Death of Two C. N. R. Enginemen.

Canadian Press Despatch. Brockville, Feb. 27.—The inquest into the deaths of Neil A. Woodcock and James A. Ritchie, two of the Canadian National enginemen belonging to Belleville, who lost their lives in the collision at Mallorytown early this morning, was opened at that village this afternoon before Dr. Fred Jackson, coroner, the evidence having to do with the removal of bodies from the wreckage. An adjournment was made to Wednesday evening next at Brockville, when trainmen concerned in the accident will be examined.

DR. CODY CLAIMS HOMEWORK NEEDED

Tells Kingston Audience More Valuable Than Attending Movies.

Canadian Press Despatch. Kingston, Feb. 27.—Rev. Canon Cody, former minister of education for Ontario, was the chief speaker at a public meeting this evening in the Kingston Memorial Hall in connection with the convention of the Urban School Trustees' Association. Other speakers were J. G. Elliott of Kingston, who introduced the president of the association, P. E. Edmunds, who presided; Prof. R. O. Small, director of vocational education in Massachusetts, and Ex-Mayor Nichol of Kingston.

Prof. Small advocated co-operative part-time schools with all kinds of industrial plants, as was the case in

Massachusetts and Wisconsin. Hon. Dr. Cody, in his address, came out strongly against the abolition of "that bugaboo," homework. In some cases, he said, students might be given too great a load of homework, but speaking broadly there was no great danger of teachers in the higher schools giving too much. With a fair amount of homework the boys and girls would be more helpfully and healthfully employed than at the movies.
