

ENGLISH CRITICS RAF **NEW BRIDGE PROPOSAL**

Claim Erection of Structure Over Thames Would Be Useless and Inartistic.

Associated Press Despatch.
London, Aug. 16.—The proposal to
build a new bridge over the Thames, adjoining St. Paul's Cathedral, is condemned by the Royal Fine Arts Commission, on the ground that the new structure would be inartistic. However, the proposal is being tenaciously adhered to by the corpora-tion, although the building of the bridge would take nearly £1,000,000 from the current taxes, without counting what sum would be available for the purpose from the corporation's existing revenues.
