SAY X-RAY WILL REVEAL SECRET OF KING'S DEATH

Herbert Carter, British Explorer, Takes Mummy From Sarcophagus.

NEWS IS GUARDED

Secrecy Reigns in Ancient Crypt—Chemists Will Study Death Cause.

Nov. 11.—More than a million days ago priests of Thebes placed Pharaoh Tutankhamen in his coffin, where he lay undisturbed even by the furore caused by the invasion of his tomb two years ago, until today, when Howard Carter lifted the mummy out of the innermost of three cased cases inside the sandstone sarcophagus and propped it up against a wall.

Dr. Derry, professor of anatomy at Cairo university, then submitted Tutankhamen to the X-rays, which when developed will, Carter expects, reveal whether the cause of Tutankhamen's death in 1348 B.C. was tuberculosis, as some Egyptologists argue from the expression of his face in more finely worked portrait statues, or whether violence ended the reign of the youthful monarch.

Will Ascertain Age.

In any case, the X-ray is certain to give the approximate age at death. If no indications of the cause are visible, Dr. Lucas, chemist of the department of antiquities, will later analyze parts of the body for possible traces of poison. The king's internal organs are contained in canopic jars now boarded up in the stone chamber under the wings of the statues which are the guardian angels of the supreme artistic treasures of the tomb.

Carter has formed a theory from indications he declined to discuss, that Tutankhamen was possibly murdered by Horemheb, general of Akhnaton, the heretic king. Horemheb himself usurped the crown, and Carter aspires to the role of detective to bring to light a crime committed 3,275 years ago, and concealed until now.

Signs of haste and indifference in the actual burial, despite the treasures heaped in the tomb, cause the theory that Tutankhamen was secretly and hurriedly laid away amid the chaos caused by conflicting claimants to his throne. However secret the funeral, it cannot have rivalled the occasion of his awakening.

Every possible precaution was taken to prevent the news of Carter's opening the magnificent innermost coffin, where Pharaoh lay wrapped in sheets of gold, from reaching the outside world.

Everyone present in the tomb was sworn in advance to secrecy as to what was found in the first disturbance of the unopened tomb, and the official communiqué so far as can be learned today, while the excavators are still engaged on their task until government officials prepare a brief Arabic account at Cairo.

Attempt Secrecy.

The secrecy preserved at the climax of the whole tomb drama was the Egyptian government's secret. The English and Americans concerned in the work declare that their hands are tied by promises under which the work is allowed to be again undertaken. The measures taken have proved effective. No crowd is around the tomb. Few tourists are here and these are unaware of the discoveries unique in the history of archeology.

This first dispatch, written on arrival, will be followed by others, giving what particulars it is possible to learn of the contents of the inner coffins.

I believe Carter has already had in his hands the most magnificent manuscript that has come down from antiquity, a papyrus roll more than one hundred feet long, the first royal book of the dead to be discovered. It is embellished with hundreds of paintings in color by Egypt's greatest artists in her supreme period of decorative art.

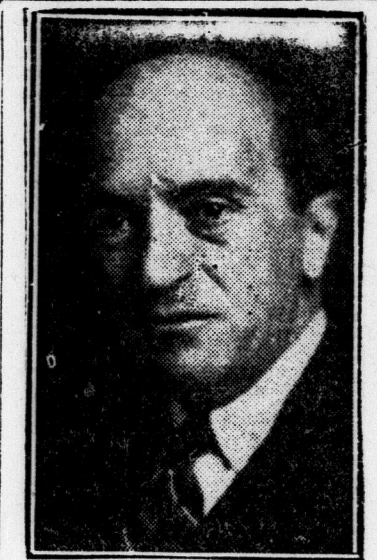
First manuscript at this work, Tutankhamen's guide to the other world, indicate that it may prove to be the tomb's finest legacy. When published in facsimile it will reveal the wonders of the school of painting founded by Akhnaton, Tutankhamen's father-in-law, at Tell-el-Amarna, a school which rivals the best work of the greatest periods of painting.

Inside the marvellous inner coffins, Carter has hoped to find the crown of upper and lower Egypt, to be handed to King Fuad as an emblem for himself and future kings of Egypt.

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WELL-KNOWN CLUB IN TOILS OF POLICE

The original charges were preferred against W. H. Knox, said to be an officer of the club, but subsequently the club itself was made the defendant.

Perjury Alleged.

George Lee of Wyoming was committed for trial by judge and jury on a charge of perjury, in the city police court here today. The charge against Lee ensued from a county police court case heard at Petrolia 1825, in which George Eoca, Rumanian farmer of Sarnia township, was accused of uttering a forged note. Specifically, it set out that Lee did "knowingly, wilfully and corruptly on oath in the county police court depose that he had not signed a promissory note dated January 8, 1925, and payable to one Thomas Wright for the sum of \$480, the said deposition being untrue."

Robert F. Edwards.

The death occurred at his home on 555 Riverview farm, Monday, Nov. 9, on Tuesday, of Robert F. Edwards, aged 75 years. Mr. Edwards, who was a member of a prominent border family, had been in poor health for some months. He had resided on the farm which is just south of the village of Corunna since 1888. Surviving are his widow, Lottie, and one son, Fred, at home. The funeral will be held privately on Thursday.

HAMMOND TO APPEAL DECISION OF DIVORCE COURT

Starts Proceedings Against Decision of Judge in Alimony Settlement at Detroit.

Detroit, Nov. 11.—Proceedings were started yesterday by Charles F. Hammond, through his counsel, David H. Crowley, to appeal the recent decision against him by Judge Clyde I. Webster awarding Mrs. Juliet K. Hammond a divorce on grounds of cruelty and an alimony settlement of \$235,000.

According to Crowley, Hammond believes Judge Webster's decision drastic. He would have the alimony settlement mitigated, says Crowley. Crowley filed a transcript of the testimony in the original suit today with Judge Webster as a preliminary to appeal proceedings that will bring the case before the state supreme court.

C. E. F. IN LONDON REMEMBERS WAR

Military Qualities of Canadians Lauded—Privates Out-number Officers.

COL. AMERY SPEAKS

London, Nov. 11.—Four hundred men of all ranks of the Canadian Expeditionary Force held a reunion in the drill hall of the London Scottish on the eve of Armistice Day. There were many generals present but far more privates.

It was an evening of reminiscence and as Prince Arthur of Connaught said, they all shared the pleasure of meeting so many old comrades of war time here.

The men made a joke of the contrast between the evening's entertainment and their old dinner, the cry went round: "Fall for rationing."

One blind man was led to his place at the table and others were wheeled in bath chairs.

Prince Arthur, who was on the Canadian staff at the time of the capture of Vimy, recalled those stirring days. "I won't pretend it was a happy time," he said, "but it was made as happy as such a time could be by my comrades in the Canadian army."

The prince referred to the "peculiarly offensive qualities" of Canadians, by which he said he meant their attitude to the men on the other side of the barbed wire.

Amery in Reminiscent Mood.

General Garnet Hughes, who was chairman, spoke of the many associations between the Canadian forces and the London Scottish who had lent their headquarters for the reunion.

High Commissioner Larkin, on behalf of Canada, placed a wreath on the London Scottish war memorial in the hall.

Colonel Amery responded to the toast of the empire, and was in a reminiscent mood. Twenty-five years ago he was in South Africa, sitting on a lump of foliage on the veldt. There was with him a Canadian officer, now dead, who had come from Canada in the hope of being allowed to take some part in the Boer war.

The conversation turned on what the dominions would do if Britain was ever engaged in a life and death struggle. The Canadian officer expressed the view, which seemed novel then, that the whole manhood of Canada would join in one vast army to fight for the empire's defense. The officer was Sam Hughes, father of their chairman that evening.

Col. Amery had another recollection of being in a canoe on Hudson Bay with a companion, and the conversation again turned on what Canada would do in an empire emergency. This time the speaker was the late Dr. John McCrae, author of the poem printed on their menu card. McCrae made reservations about the possible cause of the empire's war, but in substance he expressed the same view that Canada would support the mother country to the last man.

COFFEE HOUSE FIGHT MAY HAVE FATAL ENDING

TAXES ON CARS REDUCED IN U. S. BY COMMITTEE

Washington, Nov. 11.—Reduction of automobile taxes and repeal of many of the special excise levies was voted yesterday by the house ways and means committee. Under a provision approved by the committee, which is writing a new tariff bill, automobile pleasure cars would be taxed 3 per cent instead of 5 per cent, and the levy on automobile trucks, wagons, tires and accessories would be wiped out.

The tariff on all grades of cigars was reduced, and the levy on alcohol was cut in half. Other taxes which the committee would repeal are those on jewelry, camera lenses, photographic films and plates, firearms and ammunition, smokers' articles, coin operating machines, works of art and mah jong sets.

FORMER PREMIER SCORES EXPEDIENTY IN POLITICS

New Brunswick Man Deplores Denunciation of Contract by Premier Head.

St. John, N.B., Nov. 11.—"We have reached a crisis in our industrial development—no government should be allowed to barter away our common heritage for the sake of political expediency." So declares Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, former premier of New Brunswick, in a statement issued here last night, in which he repeatedly intimates that Premier Baxter's denunciation of the contract made by the late New Brunswick electric power commission and the International Paper Company with regard to Grand Falls power and the present Premier's suggestion that if the International Company insists upon the terms of the contract being kept, apparently the only way out is to turn over the waterpower to private interests to be developed as the price which Premier Baxter is paying large private interests for their support during the political campaign of last summer that carried him to the premiership of New Brunswick.

CORN CROP HEAVY.
