NEARING A CRISIS.
THE DISPUTE BETWEEN RUSSIA AND JAPAN.

Reports Which Indicate a Grave Aspect of Affairs.

Vienna, April 30.—The "Pittsburg Correspondenz," the newspaper organ of all European Governments, is informed from St. Petersburg.—"The diplomatic note in which the Russian claims were laid before Japan was couched in a very determined form. Prince Lobanoff, in his last interview with the Japanese Minister at St. Petersburg, pointed out that Russia could not take into consideration the fear of the Japanese Government that there would be a revolution in Japan if the Mikado acceded to Russia's demands for the revision of the treaty. Japan's reply is expected hourly. Whatever its nature, it is regarded as assured that the understanding between Russia, Germany and France will be maintained till the desired end shall be achieved." The Wiener Tageblatt says, editorially—"It is not an honest policy, and still less a wise one that is being pursued by the allied powers toward Japan. The allies have the idea of fighting, but hope to profit by threats." Drumont's Libre Parole of Paris, says in a leader on the joint protest—"Since the death of Alexander III, Russia has been treating us in a very unhandsome manner. First she dragged us into the acceptance of the invitation to the Kiel ceremony, and now is hauling us in this affair with Japan, so as to link us in common action with Germany. Candidly, to borrow seven milliards from a people, and then play them such scurvy tricks is not very nice."

The Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung (semi-official) defends Germany's part in the joint protest against the Shimomaki treaty—"We are fully justified," it says, "however little the protection of foreign interests is concerned, in going hand in hand with Russia. This, moreover, is a policy which has the advantage of promoting effectively German trade relations with East Asia." The Daily Graphic has this despatch from Yokohama—"The Japanese think that treaty of peace there will be any ground for intervention on the part of European powers. The opinion is still held generally that such intervention would cause a dangerous ferment in the country, and would imperil the Government. The Japanese are not in the frame of mind to regard with equanimity the action of the powers attempting to deprive them of the fruits of victory." Times from Hong Kong says that a British warship has gone to the Pescadore Islands to fetch the "Times" correspondent and another who are detained there by the Japanese to prevent them from sending despatches regarding the massacre, which is said to have occurred, of the Chinese garrison of that place.

Paris, April 30.—It is learned from the highest authority that the French Foreign Office is fully convinced that the U. S. Government is secretly supporting Japan and this belief is shared in the Russian and German embassies here. This feeling is causing the French Government a good deal of anxiety concerning the possible outcome of the joint protest of France, Germany and Russia against Japanese occupation of Chinese mainland territory. The Frankfurter Zeitung has a St. Petersburg despatch, which says that Japan is making extensive preparations for defense. She has mobilized large bodies of troops and has erected fortifications and blocked important coast points with mines. Several swift steamers have recently been bought for the Japanese Government in England and America. Russia, the despatch says, is still sending troops to Vladivostok.

Return of Queen Victoria to England.

THE ONE-MAN-ONE-VOTE BILL.

Crew of a Dutch Ship Massacred by Moors, Who Carry Off the Cargo.

AN ENGLISH BY-ELECTION.

Investigation into the Elbe Disaster—A French Troopship Ashore in the Suez Canal—Stolen Arms and Ammunition in the Chitral Rebel Camp.

London, April 30.—Queen Victoria arrived at Sheerness at 9.15 o'clock this evening. She will remain on board the royal yacht to-night.

DIVISION IN THE COMMONS.
In the House of Commons a motion by Sir William Harcourt, that the remainder of the session be devoted wholly to the consideration of Government business, was carried by 252 to 230.

TROOPSHIP ASHORE.
The French troopship Tibet, conveying troops for Madagascar, is ashore in the Suez Canal. She lies in a bad position and her situation is such that passage through the canal is suspended pending her floating.

FLOUR GOES UP.
A meeting of the Corn Millers' Association was held at Leeds to-day, at which it was decided to make a further advance in the price of flour by a shilling a sack. This action is taken in consequence of the high prices of wheat in all of the foreign markets.

ONE MAN ONE VOTE.
In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Shaw-Lefevre, President of the Local Government Board, introduced a bill providing for the abolition of plural voting, and for the holding of all elections on the same day. The bill passed the first reading.

A PRECAUTIONARY MEASURE.
A despatch from Odeberg, Austrian Silesia, says that a force of 1,000 Russian and 200 Cossack cavalry are concentrated at Sosnowice, across the Russian border, the St. Petersburg Government fearing a repetition of the May day excesses of 1893.

MASSACRED BY MOORS.
The Dutch brigantine Ann was towed into Gibraltar to-day. She reports that on the afternoon of April 28, while becalmed off the Rif coast, a party of Moors attacked her and shot and killed members of the crew and seriously wounded the captain and mate. After massacring the crew the pirates carried off the provisions and cargo of the vessel.

ANOTHER REBEL DEFEAT.
Havana, April 30.—The force of insurgents which were said to have been routed on April 24 by Spanish troops under Major Tejerizo in the vicinity of Ramon Yaguajay. There they again met the Spanish forces under Tejerizo and the rebels are reported in this encounter to have lost 62 by death, while many were wounded. The Spanish loss is said to be six dead and three wounded.

THE ELBE DISASTER.
The coroner's inquiry into the sinking of the North German Lloyd steamship Elbe, on January 3 last, was resumed at Lowestoft, England, this morning. The steward of the British steamer Craighero, which ran into and sank the Elbe, testified that he went on deck at five o'clock on the morning of the collision and saw on the port side what looked like several lights on fishing boats. Then, he continued, he went to the galley where the fire was burning and found there the mate and the look-out man, and they all stayed there until the collision occurred.

CHITRAL REBELS.
The Times publishes a despatch from Dir, in the Chitral district, which says—"The Khan of Dir has arrived here with Sher Afzul, the fugitive usurper of the throne of Chitral, and 1,500 other prisoners. He drove Sher Afzul through the snow and starved him into surrender. The political effect of the capture is very important. The whereabouts of Umra Khan is uncertain. Twenty of his men have been captured and disarmed of Martini carbines. The large number of stolen rifles and the immense quantities of government ammunition found in the hands of the rebels have caused considerable surprise. Ten thousand cartridges were found in the Dir fort, in sealed government boxes."

THE BERESFORD-MARLBOROUGH WEDDING.
At the fashionable St. George's Church, Hanover Square, at one o'clock this afternoon, Lillian Duchess of Marlborough, formerly Mrs. Louis Hamersley, of New York, was married to Lord William Beresford, fourth son of the Duke of Devonshire, formerly Colonel of the Ninth Lancers, who gained the most coveted of all military decorations in Great Britain, the Victoria Cross, by riding back into the thick of the fight at the battle of Ulundi, to rescue a Lancer, whom he placed across his saddle and then cut his way out to safety. The wedding was the smartest event seen in London for a long time past. For hours previous to the time fixed for the ceremony the vicinity of St. George's Church was packed with dense crowds of people. The church was crowded with royalty, members of the diplomatic corps, representatives of the various colonies, Governors of

different colonial possessions, officers of the army and navy and members of the elite English and American society. The steps of the church were covered with red cloth and were lined by an eager crowd of people. The bridegroom, attended by his brother, Lord Marcus Beresford. The bride entered the church leaning on the arm of her step-son, the young Duke of Marlborough. The bride was dressed in a dove gray coat and skirt of brocade satin, with white lace waistcoat and cuffs with diamond buttons, a white bonnet with gray chiffons and a magnificent white veil. She carried a large silver prayer book. As the principals took up their positions the choir sang a bridal hymn and the service commenced. The Rev. James Edgar Sheppard, honorary chaplain to the Queen and sub-dean of the chapels royal, officiated, assisted by the Rev. David Anderson, rector of St. George's Church. The service was fully choral and occupied half an hour. At its conclusion the party went to the vestry, where the bride and bridegroom were congratulated by crowds of friends. After the wedding ceremony a luncheon was served at the London residence of the Duchess, No. 3 Carlton House Terrace. Lord and Lady Beresford left during the afternoon for the country seat, Desdemona, Dorking, where the honeymoon was spent.

THE WALLER CASE.
The United States Ambassador at Paris has received verbal intimation and definite instructions from Washington regarding the case of Mr. John L. Waller, formerly U. S. Consul at Tananarive, Island of Madagascar, now imprisoned in France under a 20-year sentence, imposed by a court martial on the ground that he was in communication with the Hovas. Mr. Eustis has verbally and in writing communicated his instructions to the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Hanotaux, but the latter has not yet replied to these communications. The foregoing would indicate that the United States Government is dissatisfied from Madagascar the report of the U. S. Consul there in regard to Mr. Waller's case, that the conclusions drawn from it justify such intervention, and that it will probably result in a fresh joint inquiry.

Murder Cases at the Assizes—Notes from the Queen City.

Toronto, April 30.—Alex. G. Wilkie, the alleged defaulting cashier of the W. D. Matthews & Co., who was arrested in Chicago on Saturday night, reached Toronto this morning in the custody of a detective, and was taken to the police station. He returned voluntarily, and has promised to have the case disposed of as quickly as possible. He was arraigned before Police Magistrate Denison at the coroner's office on the charges on the docket. He is charged with the murder of a young man, who was shot on March 9th, 1885, in the vicinity of St. Matthews, the sum of \$1,000. Mr. M. asked the judge desired time in which to obtain counsel. Wilkie adopted the suggestion, and asked for a remand until Wednesday. He was then removed to the jail with the other prisoners.

The commencement exercises of McMaster University were held last afternoon and evening. Rev. E. W. Dudson preaching the baccalaureate sermon this evening in Walker Row Baptist Church.
