

## PARKDALE TROLLEY EXTENSION.

How a Beautiful Residential District Could Be Served and the Public Benefit Thereby.

Spite of the good service which the Toronto Railway Company renders the citizens, there are many thousands who have never seen the beauties of the lake shore at South Parkdale. Here is one of the healthiest and prettiest spots in Toronto, and the reason why it is not the exhibition entrance in Dufferin-street. Here they have a yearly picnic, and the picnic grounds are the most romantic park the city possesses. Hence it is no wonder that a movement, which promises to be successful, has sprung up for a car service daily to this pleasant spot, and thence within sight of the sparkling waters of the lake on to the junction with the King, Queen and Mimico routes.

## The Afternoon's Excursion.

To inspect the district and to judge of the feasibility of this project, a sub-committee of the Board of Works and influential residents of South Parkdale gathered yesterday afternoon in the pleasant parlour at the exhibition entrance. There were present: Messrs. H. H. Cook, Hugh Blair, E. J. Musson, J. M. Wright, George Hastings, H. N. Street, Commissioner of the Board of Works, R. H. Holmes and many other residents of the district.

The tour of inspection was west from Dufferin-street in Dominion-street to Duncannon-avenue. Along this first stage of the route there are glorious views of the lake, the island to the east and Humber Bay to the west. Between Dominion-street and the water front is to be formed a Parkdale athletic resort, which its promoters say will rival that at Rosedale. Leaving Duncannon-avenue, the party proceeded along Victoria-avenue to Downing-avenue, and then to the grounds of H. H. Cook by a new street, which is not yet opened, and which is a continuation of Victoria-avenue. The intersection of Wilson-avenue and King-street, the railway line opposite this point, will be crossed by a bridge.

The inspection party returned by way of King-street, turning south along Springwater-avenue in front of the Grand Trunk Railway station, and then on to Dufferin-street, north of the Grand Trunk tracks.

The recommendations. The special features of this extension of the King-street trolley route are about a mile were pointed out to Chairman Lamb, who took the liveliest interest in the information supplied. He was told, what he knows, that better use should be made of the exhibition grounds, which had cost the city a couple of hundred thousand dollars. The water front, which cost the city \$30,000. On the athletic question all agreed that a desirable location could not be found, and it was proposed that the trolley should pass its course. Then the pleasant walks, with seats on the cliff, the proposed lake drive, the close proximity of South Parkdale railway station. And it must not be omitted there were most eligible yachts, on which the sound of the mason's chisel, the workmen's hammer, were heard as soon as City Engineer Keating arrived in obedience to the summons of the Board of Works, his flat to the Toronto Railway Company, that the new route be laid. This can be done by arrangement with the city as to track foundations and mileage. Before the party dispersed, President Lamb, who expected, he issued in a few days by the Board of Works sub-committee.

Other features of the afternoon were the recognition of the necessity for railway gates at the Duncannon-avenue crossing, the alternative of going on to the Sunnyside boat-house instead of stopping short at Wilson-avenue. If the extension of the land would give the right of way from the latter street to grade down to the water-front, the water-front could be built, there would be a splendid drive, just above the water level, to the existing Mimico line, along the lake shore.

The citizens would by this route be enabled to reach High Park from any part of the city for one fare. It was thought that this would be the cheapest way of reaching High Park, and the city, provided the right of way were secured, would not exceed \$10,000; whereas the plan proposed some few years ago, of bridging the Grand Trunk Railway, would probably cost from \$30,000 to \$40,000.

It was contended that the city was interested in all these schemes, and that an increase of residential taxpayers would follow the giving effect to the desire of the people of South Parkdale. Anticipating it was pointed out that a great scenic route from the Union Station, along Front-street, through the grounds of the Old Fort, and the Exhibition grounds, to the water-front, was already contemplated by the Toronto Railway Company. Such even as the latter portion of the route, by carriage from Victoria Park to High Park, with fine lake views during the latter portion of the route.

But these are indications of what developments may be made in the future. What is specially desired at present is that Chairman Lamb's sub-committee get the endorsement of the Board of Works and the King-street extension be ready this summer.
