The ratepayers of the township of Thibury West last week voted on a by-law to spend \$40,000 on graveling the roads of that township, and carried the by-law by a vote of 92 to 32. The work will be started soon.

Miss Lillian Field was very pleasantly surprised by the pupils and friends of S.S. No. 2, Metcalfe, where she has taught for the past two years, by receiving from them a most beautiful silver casserole with ivory handles.

James Noonan, aged 37, a farmer of Bedford Township, in Frontenac County, was killed on Wednesday night at seven o'clock by being struck by lightning. He was closing the door of his garage when the fatality occurred. He was unmarried. Fire broke out about 6.30 p.m. Thursday, in the building formerly known as the old Simpson House, Glencoe, now being occupied by Mr. Vause, shoe repairer. The building was almost destroyed. The cause of the fire is unknown.

About 125 acres have been planted in celery this season in and around what is known as the old Lake Burwell grounds. It is the largest acreage ever put in and the crop, if fair, should yield 200 car loads or thereabouts.

A farmer west of Kingsville had a cat which he gave to a friend seven miles north of Lake Erie. The cat was taken to its new home in a bag. In four days pussy had made the return trip to her old home, looking none the worse for her experience.

On Thursday evening July 6th the young people of S.S. No. 17, Plympton, gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. Whyte, 16th con., and presented Miss Gladys Whyte, who has been teacher in S.S. 17 for the past four years and who has resigned her position in that section, with a splendid kodak.

Fred Sheppard, 8th con. Bosanquet, has been confined to the house nearly three weeks, the result of an accident which occurred when he was unloading gravel. The horses started and he was caught between the wagon and the whiffletree, and was bruised very badly before the team could be stepped.

John Leslie, a farmer on the 11th concession, Mersea township, Essex Co., was instantly killed by a bolt of lightning while in a field. Mr. Leslie was alone at the time, and his body was found shortly after death by his son Neil. The dead man came to this country a few years ago from Illinois, and was highly respected.

While leading a horse which she had gone out to catch, the animal broke away throwing Mrs. Rebekah Cascadden, of Ruthven, to the ground, seriously fracturing one of her hips. It was found necessary to reset the bone on Tuesday and it is believed that it will be six months before she will be able to walk again.

John M. McKenzie, a well-known business man of Forest for many years, mounted a ladder Wednesday to investigate the eaves of his residence, when a rung broke, and, in trying to save himself, the ladder swung and threw him forcibly to the ground. Mr. McKenzie had his left arm broken above the elbow and was cut about the face.

The mysterious death last month of nine young cattle belonging to Wm. Moore, a well-known Shedden farmer, is still unsolved. An analysis of the contents of the stomachs and bladders of two of the dead animals, which were sent to Ottawa, gave no clue to the cause of the death and the Dominion authorities are puzzled to know the nature of the malady.

Howard Fraleigh of Forest who is making a tour of the Old Country writes from Belfast, Ireland, under date of July 1, that during a week's visit in that city he had witnessed no trouble of any kind. He referred to the seizure of the Four Courts building in Dublin where O'Connor tried to hold it against the Free State but said that disturbance was soon quelled.

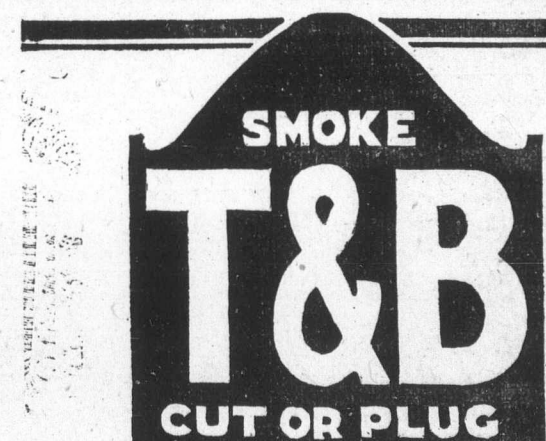
