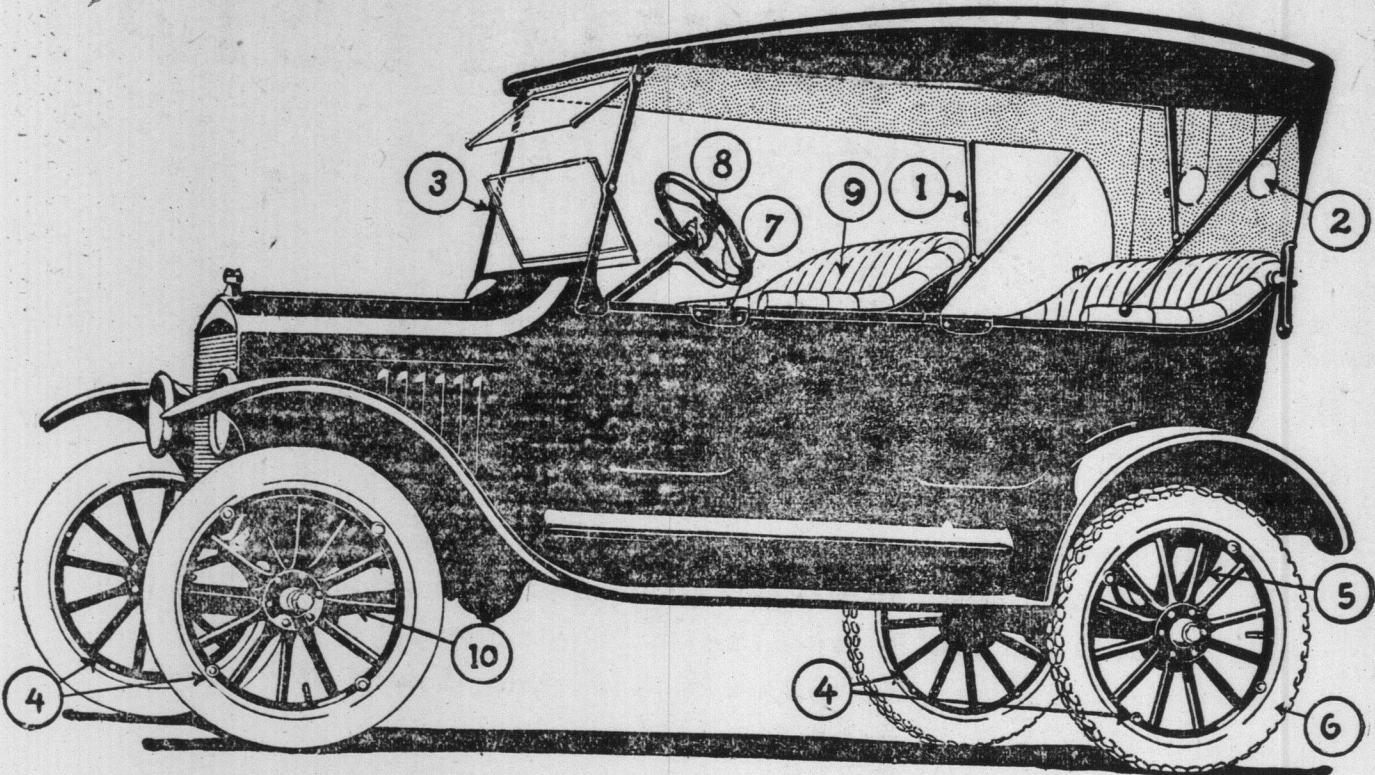


## Ford Announcement

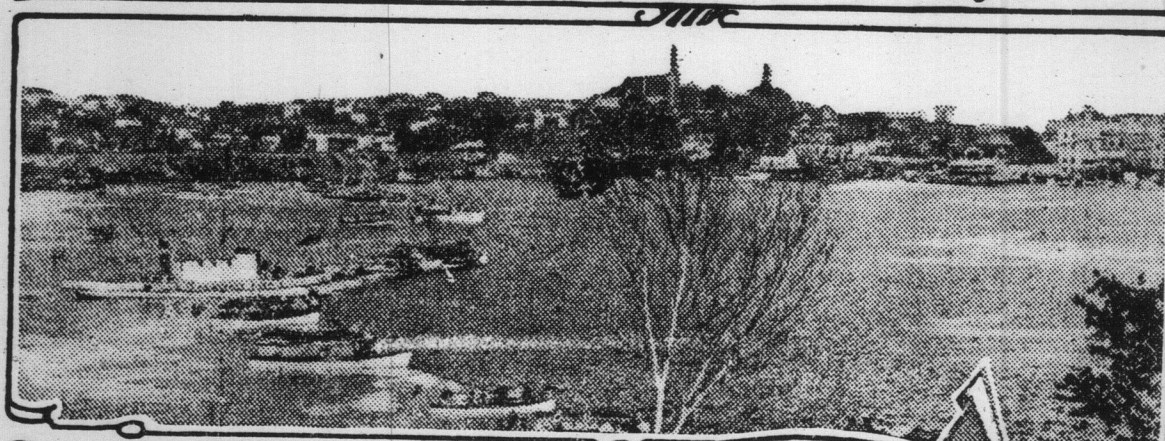

## "Kenora" A Summer's Idyll

There are some places which never lose their charm as holiday resorts, and which as the seasons pass attract visitors as a magnet does the needle. Such may be claimed for Kenora and the Lake of the Woods. This lovely spot is within easy access to all, situated as it is on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the beautiful Province of Ontario.

The Lake of the Woods is a perfect earthly Paradise, thronged in its thousands of islands, most of which are owned by private Canadian citizens who spend their summers there leading the simple life.

A splendid way to see the beauties of the Lake of the Woods is to make a stay at Kenora, and from there hire a motor launch and go sailing among the islands. The Lake is studded over by a perfect archipelago, the islands numbering several thousand, some mere islets of jagged rock, others being several miles in extent on which are built pretty bungalows and camps.

Most of the islands are thickly timbered, the trees growing to the water's edge, and in the early summer months water lilies, both golden yellow and pure white are found everywhere. Blueberries and other wild fruit also grow abundantly on most of the islands, hundreds of pounds being picked by the Indians and shipped to the different cities for consumption.

Kenora itself is a pretty little town built on the lake front, commanding a splendid view of the lake. It has a large number of stores, a Public Library, and is lit by electricity. The Tourist Hotel, in the Main Street, gives tourists every comfort.

There are camps on several of the

larger islands run by the Y.M.C.A. and the M.L.A. of Winnipeg, where the tourist can have accommodation at reasonable rates, while on Coney Island there is a fine sandy bathing beach, and pavilion for dancing.

Happiness seems to be the dominant note at Kenora, and its vicinity, everywhere one meets parties of young people on pleasure boat, boating, bathing, or picnicking, and the stillness of the air is broken only by merry laughter, or the song of the birds.

The district is much frequented by artists, photographers, and sportsmen, each finding a wide field for his particular bent. The lake is a perfect angler's Paradise, many a trout being landed before break of day to provide breakfast for the campers. Here too in their season are to be found moose and bear, as well as other big game.

A short distance out of Kenora is an Indian Reserve, which is a never failing source of interest to tourists who wish to see the Red Men in their native woods.

A few miles out of Kenora are the little towns of Norman and Keewatin, both of which are within walking distance, the road winding on the hillside affords an uninterrupted view of the lake, every bend opening up new beauty spots.

Who can ever forget the glorious moonlight on the Lake, the intense stillness broken only by the dip of an oar or the throb of a motor boat, when the shadows deepen on the islands, and "when the moon sees her unwrinkled face reflected" in the blue water? Kenora is redolent of romance, is indeed like a tone poem of perfect music where there is no discordant note, and where as each evening closes one can say, we have come to the end of a perfect day.

## PROFIT FROM POTATOES

In view of recent investigation into the conditions of potato districts competing with the Maritime Province it would appear that spraying potatoes will this year be more profitable than usual. Those who have potatoes planted are fortunate and now that they have spent from \$100 to \$150 per acre that will without spraying turn 150 bushels of potatoes, they should consider investing another \$20 in labor and material to spray five times and thus insure from 100 to 200 more bushels of potatoes and also make certain that the whole crop will be sound.

The spray calendar for potatoes is:

First spray, when plants are six inches high 4-4-40 Bordeaux and 1½ lbs. arsenate of lime to 40 gallons.

Second spray, 12 to 14 days later, 6-6-40 Bordeaux and 1½ lbs. arsenate of lime to 40 gals.

Third, fourth and fifth sprays two weeks apart and of the same material as the second spray. If bugs are not present the poison may be omitted.

Apply at least 60 gallons per acre and better make it 100 gallons per acre.

Thorough spraying costs only \$20, for five applications and will give a greater increase in yield than a half ton of high grade fertilizer. No one would think of planting potatoes without fertilizer or manure, yet the spray only costs one half as much and will give a greater increase, yet it is often neglected.

The indications are that spraying will be particularly profitable in 1920, so every grower is urged to spray thoroughly.

## CANADA'S STANDARD APPLE BARREL

Prior to 1918 the Federal law with respect to the size of apple barrels required a minimum capacity of 96 quarts. This sized barrel was used in Nova Scotia, but in Ontario a slightly larger barrel was used. At a Conference of Fruit Growers, held in Ottawa in March, 1918, at which representatives from all fruit growing provinces in Canada were present, it was unanimously recommended that legislation be enacted standardizing the apple barrel. Legislation in accordance with this resolution was assented to on May 24th, 1918, prescribing a Standard Apple Barrel of a capacity of 7,056 cubic inches, 17 1/8th inches in the head, 26 inches between heads, inside measure, 64 inches circumference at the bilge, outside measurement.

This became effective June 1st, 1919. In order that those having old size apple barrels left over should suffer no loss, permission was given to use such old barrels (manufactured previous to June 1st, 1919) during the past season.

There is no doubt as to the benefits which must come from the adoption of the Standard Barrel, and as Growers and Shippers have been given every opportunity to dispose of the old barrels, the Act will be rigidly enforced during the present season. Growers and Shippers should, therefore, see that their barrels furnished them are in accordance with the requirements of the Act, as anyone using barrels of any other size than prescribed, is liable to a penalty for violation of the Law.

## UNIQUE WAR SOUVENIR

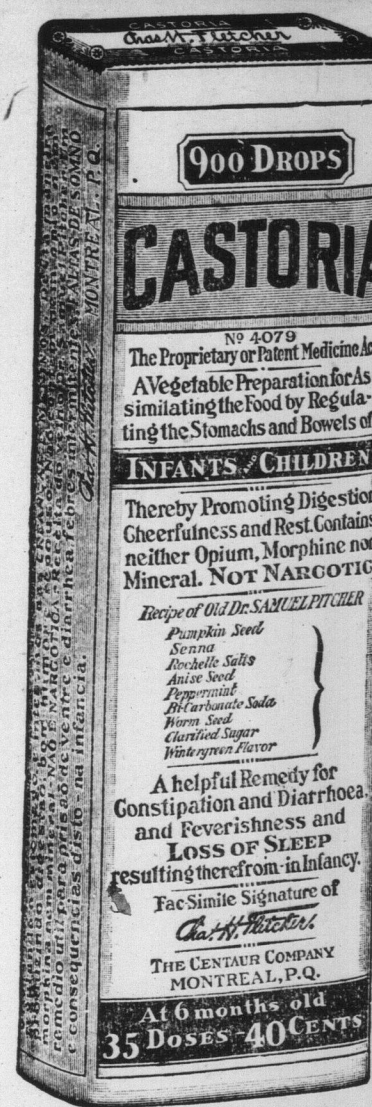
An electric lamp, made almost entirely of souvenirs of the World War has been made by J. R. Robertson, of New Glasgow, N. S.

For three years Mr. Robertson has been working on the lamp. A piece of twisted steel plate from the ill fated Mt. Blanc, which was blown to pieces in Halifax Harbor in Dec., 1917, is in the base, as well as one of the first shrapnel shells made in Nova Scotia. A sword handle is also used in the make up of the lamp, as well as the iron helmet worn by Private McIsaac of Sydney N. S. This helmet is fringed with rifle cartridges. The cartridges were used in military funerals in Halifax. On the helmet, and about the lamp are numerous metal insignia.

The lamp pull is a button from the uniform of an Indian sniper from Nova Scotia, who had over 70 Germans to his credit at the close of the war.
