BUSY BEAVERS TIE UP LOCAL ELECTRIC SERVICE SATURDAY

They Seal Dam At Corbett Lake Tight and Shut Off Supply Of Water To Power House Pond—Lights Fade Out Gradually.

A colony of beavers at Corbett's Lake, seven miles from Bridgetown, plunged this burg into complete darkness about eleven o'clock on Saturday night. The business men rushed for oil lamps and wax candles as the town became enveloped in a pall of blackness. This is how it all came about. On Saturday morning it was noticed that the water in the electric power house dam was lower than it should be, and that the amount was diminishing with some rapidity. The sources of supply were followed out and at Corbett's Lake the mystery was solved. The gate of the dam at the outlet there through which water flows passing eventually to the power house pond though left up a certain distance some time ago was now found sealed. The space beneath the gate was cleverly dammed and the work was that of a colony of beavers

which, when they found that the slight raising of the gate was lowering the water in the lake to a point which did not suit their household economy, at once applied a remedy. Thus the water supply which is necessary for the electric plant gradually dwindled. The lights in town grew dimmer and dimmer and finally expired altogether, though the original cause of trouble was removed hours before the water had to run for seven miles to the power house dam before the depleted supply there began to be at all renewed.

Of course before Sunday night the water in the dam was at normal and electricity was once more common and available.

About two years ago the industrious beavers put over the same stunt but till this latest happening it was supposed that there were none of these animals left in the lake.

Lawrencetown.—The scarcity of water around town has been relieved. The water in the reservoir had gone low for some days, and investigation disclosed the fact that the outlet pipe from the source of supply in the mountain had become filled up. A considerable force of men was put on and normal conditions restored.

At present there appears to be no definite certainty as to whether the evaporator will be put into operation this season or not. The market is reported flat for dried apples and present supplies more than sufficient for present needs. It is yet a little too early to predict that the evaporator will not be run.
