During July thousands of osteo paths and members of allied professions gathered in Toronto from all parts of the United States and Canada to attend the International Convention of Osteopaths. Several of the visitors toured the country in the interests of osteopathy.

Final figures showing the total live lobster catch on the Nova Scotia coasts, for the season ending June 1st., show a total of 8,585,900 lbs. valued at \$1,364,141, an increase over the 1924 season of 3,687,400 lbs., in quantity and approximately half a million dollars in value.

During the year, there have been committed to the Children's Aid Society of Annapolis, 30 children, of Digby 13, and of Yarmouth 18. Of the Annapolis Children, 21 have been returned to their own homes, and 15 of them are being maintained without cost to the Municipality; the remaining six at a cost of less than \$1.00 per week. Three are being provided for by the Pension Board, 3 are in free homes, one in the Maritime Home for Girls, Truro, one in the Home of the Good Shepherd, Halifax, and one in the Industrial School Halifax

Of the 13 children in Digby Children's Aid Society, one has been returned to her home and is being maintained without cost to public funds, 6 are in free homes, 2 are being provided for by the Pension Board, 3 are in boarding homes, and 1 is in the Industrial School. Two of those in boarding homes have been maintained at but little cost to Town Funds, their maintenance baving been provided for by court order (Since October 1st, two boarding homes have been placed in free homes,

the most perplexing problem your, Agent has had to face. While under which we are compelled to labor, this course is a most Ifficult one to pursue,

The 10 placed in free homes are all doing well. Four of this number were removed from County Homes, 1 from Annapolis, 2 from Digby and 1 from Argyle. Nine of the total number (61) are receiving Institutional care, 5 in Roman Catholic and 4 in Protestant Institutions. In most cases sof those receiving Institutional care, the delinquency was of too serious a nature to permit place ment in private homes. For the 5 in boarding homes, there is good prospect of securing free homes in the immediate future, as they are all of the placeable class. (Two as noted above have since been placed.)

The total number of children under the care of the Society, during the period of the Agent's engagement is 122. Their places of settlement are as follows:

Rotarian John Anderson, presi lent of the club, asked if it had been thought of that there are a grea many people in a country whose teeth were not so good as they ha been years before and that it was obviously easier for them to drink orange juice than eat an apple. While orchard acreage has de-

creased in the Dominion, growers are producing a better type of fruit than formerly, and the output i showing an increased value, Mr McIntosh said, In this matter of reduced quan

tity but improved quality, Quebe province has displayed its capacit to produce of the finest. McIntosh Reds, Fameuse, St. Lawrence, an other varieties have taken first place at international exhibitions.

Imported Apples There is a great opportunity for

the development of apple orchards in this province, the speaker point ed out. Last year, Montreal consumed something like a thousand cars of apples; only 27 carloads came out of the province of Quebe There is no spot in Canada more favorable for apple developmen than Quebec province, Mr. McIntosh declared.

Five provinces are now producing apples, Nova Ccotia, New Brunswick. Mr. McIntosh said he hoped to se the day when the prairie province would be producing them.
