LEWIS XV. as I have faid in another place, visited me habitually. He could not dispense with my company, which was become absolutely necessary to him: but this inclination had not entirely removed a taste for transitory amours. He yielded to them by constitution; but never reflected on them without repentance. After an adventure of gallantry, he was more constant than ever. Remorfebrought him back to himfelf and to me. I may venture to fay, that I enjoyed his infidelity; and had he been entirely divested of it, he would have given way to some other passion, that would have separated him from me. I was under apprehensions for some time that his mind would take a warlike turn: I defired Maurice count Saxe, who regularly paid his court to him, after the campaigns in Flanders, not to dwell to much upon battles and fieges: but lewis assured me, as I have already mentioned, that he had facrificed this inclination to the welfare of France.
