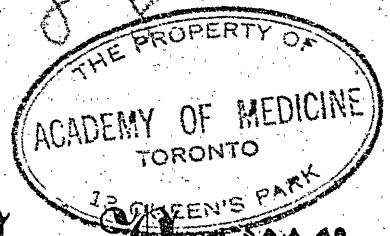

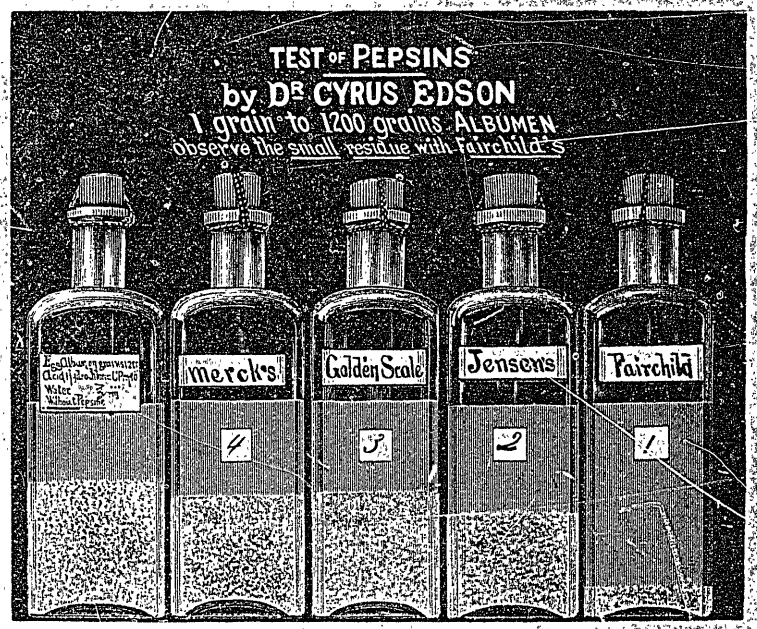

I have made a comparative test of Fairchild's, Jensen's, Merck's and Golden Scale pepsins under exactly parallel conditions.

1200 grains of coagulated egg albumen with 8 oz. water and 40 minims acid hydrochloric c. p. were subjected to the action of 1 grain of pepsin for four hours at 105° F., each bottle being shaken at intervals of six minutes.

The better for comparison, I prepared one bottle with 1200 grains coagulated albumen, 8 oz. water and 40 minims acid hydrochloric c. p., and subjected it to the same conditions as the others, without pepsin.

The pepsins tested were purchased by me from reliable druggists in this city.

The above photograph plainly shows the digestion accomplished by each pepsin.
