INCOME TAX

DEDUCTIBILITY OF COURT ORDERED COSTS FOR
MAINTENANCE—SUGGESTED EXTENSION OF PLAN BEYOND
COURT ORDERS

GOVERNMENT MEASURES TO STIMULATE

EFFECT ON INTEREST RATES OF LARGE BORROWING BY GOVERNMENT—REQUEST FOR ESTIMATE OF TOTAL BORROWINGS TO END OF 1978

Mr. Ron Huntington (Capilano): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Finance. In view of the fact that the government is considering borrowing \$300 million from our chartered banks for the purchase of the Orion and the fact that there are other reports of further government intentions to borrow from the commercial lending sector, can the minister tell the House what effect such government borrowings will have on interest rates and the effect such sizeable borrowings from commercial banks will have on the credit available to the private sector?

Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of Finance): We anticipate no difficulties in that regard.

Mr. Huntington: Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question for the Minister of Finance. Does he have an estimate of the total borrowings that the government will be requesting of the commercial banks to the end of 1978, and can the Minister of Finance explain why an organization with a \$42 billion cash flow has to even consider borrowing from the commercial sector?
