SCARBORO HOUSE FIFTY THOUSAND TOTALLY BURNED MUST BE SPENT

Glen Morgan's Home Was Destroyed With All Its Contents. Forest Hill Railway Will Also Start Work Early Next Year.

EFFORTS SAVED BARN TO WATCH OPERATIONS

Flames Are Thought to Have Started From the Kitchen. Township Engineer Will Be Stationed on Woodbine Avenue Work.

The solid brick house of Glen Morgan, situated on the corner of Woodbine and Forest Hill roads, was destroyed by fire on Monday night. The damage is estimated at over \$5,000, about half of which is covered by insurance.

Mr. Morgan was awakened about 1 o'clock in the morning by smoke, and, on going to his bedroom, he discovered that the house was on fire and that there was small hope of saving it. He called his wife and children outside and, on going to the kitchen, he found flames coming from the door. He tried to get the fire out, but it was too late. The fire spread rapidly, and the house was completely destroyed.

CLEANING UP WALL STREET.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 19.—(Can. Press).—Gov. Sulzner has signed the last two of the series of stock exchange reform bills passed by the legislature. One provides that trading by brokers against customers' orders in stocks, bonds or other evidences of debt of a corporation, company or association shall constitute a felony. The other requires brokers to deliver to customers memoranda describing the securities purchased and sold, also giving the name of the person or corporation from which they were purchased or to whom they were sold.

STRIKE AT MACHINERY WORKS.

GALT, May 19.—(Special).—Thirty union workers of the Canada Machinery Works are today on strike. They demand an increase in pay to 30 cents an hour. The men this morning held a meeting in the Trades and Labor Hall, but the business was not made public. Mr. Kenny, manager of the Canada Machinery Corporation, Limited, says: "The difference between the men and the company is minimum wage. The men are asking a minimum for all molders. We pay the majority of the men more than the minimum, but the company can't accept the principle of a firm, as all workmen are not up to the wage standard set."
