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

STARS AND STRIPES AS BIRTHDAY GIFT

Princess Mary Will Receive Bracelet With Flags of Allies and U.S.A.

COURT PRO-AMERICAN

King Makes Remarkable Speech on Friendship Between Britain and U.S.

Special Cable to The Torento World.

LONDON, April 1.—Princess Mary, on her 18th birthday, April 24, will receive from her mother a \$2500 bracelet bearing the flags of England, France, Russia, Belgium and the United States done in jewels and gold enamel. Originally her majesty had intended to have pictures of the rulers of the countries of allies, with President Wilson added as a friend, but she finally decided on flags as a more permanent souvenir.
