MADRID, Nov. 3.—Warlike preparations continue here on a scale that contrasts atrougly with the assurance of the Foreign Minister to several foreign embassics that Spain intends to respect the territorial and political status quo in Morocco, and that the Government believes reparation should be made and indemnity given by the Sultan of Morocco for the attacks made upon the Spanish troops at Meilila. Eight thousand men are kept in readiness to start for Meilila within twenty-four hours; 14,000 troops will be concentrated in Southern Andalusia, from whence they can be rapidly carried to Morocco. A dispatch has just been received by the Government here, saying that owing to the severe punishment General Macias inflicted upon the Riffians on October 31, they have disappeared from the neighborhood of the forts at Meilila Firing has, therefore, ceased all along the line.
