ation of his little book, than say anything further in explication of its contents.

His Grammar may be considered by some as possessing few recommendations: if it possesses any, he will not regret that he has devoted so much time and attention to the subject. In conclusion, be will merely add that the present edition is published in a revised form; and that it contains many additions and alterations; as to the utility of which, he quotes the words of a well-known classic author:\*—"Emendatio pars studiorum utilissima; neque enim sine causa creditum est, siylum non minus agere, cùm delet."
