

THE INDUSTRIAL CITY



THE City of Hamilton—known as the manufacturing centre of Canada — is situated on the shores of Hamilton Bay, an almost perfect landlocked harbor at the head of Lake Ontario. It extends from east to west for a distance of about six miles, and from north to south from Bay to Mountain, for about three miles. From the Summit of the Escarpment, or Mountain, as it is generally called, a magnificent view is to be had. The City lies immediately below, with its wide, regularly laid out and well paved streets, its fine residences and

public buildings, and its wealth of beautiful shade trees. To the north are the clear waters of Hamilton Bay; to the west is a bird's eye view of Dundas Valley; while to the east, five miles away, is Burlington Beach—Hamilton's favorite Summer Resort—separating Hamilton Bay from Lake Ontario; and to the southeast "The Fruit Garden of Canada," with its fields of green and gold, greets the eye in a panoramic view seldom equalled, and certainly not surpassed, by any other on the American Continent—people from all over the world having come to visit this place and view the great garden in all its glory. About one million dollars' worth of fruit is shipped annually from this section, the greater portion of it passing through Hamilton.
