# REPORT ON LIGHTING SYSTEM SATISFACTORY

Hamilton Will Have Up-to-date Plant-Will Be Paid For in Thirty Years.

HAMILTON, June 7 .- (Special.)-E. Sifton, consulting engineer, to-night read and explained his report on the proposed municipal power and lighting plant to the members of the city council at an informal meeting in the mayor's office. While the report, when published, was generally admitted to be a very clear and comprehensive do-cument, there was a feeling among some of the aldermen that it was too good to be true. Mr. Sifton was there-fore to-night called upon to go fully into the details of the report and ex-plain just how his estimates and conclusions were reached. This he did in a most satisfactory manner. In their search for knowledge in the matter the mayor, controllers and aldermen fired all sorts of questions at the engineer, to allow of which he replied fully and clearly, and apparently convinced his questioners of the correctness of his figures. After the meeting one of the aldermen, who is commonly credited with being a Cataract supporter, ex-pressed the opinion that the report is a good one. The estimates for all contingencies are liberal and every possible unforeseen circumstance in the construction of the plant seems to have been provided f

A Complete System. The report includes plans for the supply of power to the city and to commercial users and a system of street and residence lighting covering the entire city as at present laid out, and also provides for a 2 1-2 per cent increase in the street area of the city. Sinking fund, interest depreciation, expansion of plant, cost of operation, contains and every apparent postaccounting and every apparent posfactor in the success of the system have been taken into account. all the city is promised a complete modern power and light system, which will have been entirely paid for in thirty years, and which, in the mean-time will supply all kinds of elec-tric current at prices lower than are
