CHICAGO, May 31 .- Much selling to-

May liquidation carried down oats. Holders were discouraged by favorable crop reports from the states of largest production. Southwestern damage, due to heat and dry winds, seeined in the main ignored.

A moderate amount of selling pressure on pork acted as a drag on the whole list of packing-house products.

LIVERPOOL. May 31.—The market on Thursday was characterized by excifed urading, especially in May, in which shorts covered freely. July received speculative support. The forecast of lighter Argentine shipments and the poor quality of arrivals caused May to advance from Wednesday. Corn was excited with heavy speculative buying on the forecast of light Argentine shipments and closed 1½c higher than Wednesday.
