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ENOUGH STORES ON QUEEN ROAD

Property Holders Interested
Object to Removing Restrictions on West Side of Street and Present Petition to Board of Control—Fair Wage Officer Appointed.

Protesting against the proposal to remove the residential restrictions from the west side of Avenue Road between Cottenham street and Macpherson avenue, a deputation of interested property holders waited upon the board of control yesterday morning. A petition containing the names of 77 people was presented, which urged that no action be taken by the city as the district was already sufficiently well served with stores. Mayor Geary, however, explained that a report had already been ordered on the situation and hence no action was taken by the board.

In urging that the west side of the street be retained for residential purposes, the deputation claimed that there were plenty of stores south of the C. P. R. tracks now to serve the whole of the district. It was claimed that the residences on the west side of the street were of a first-class character and to alter them in order to convert them into stores would have a detrimental effect on the properties adjoining to the rear, since it would be necessary to erect stables and storehouses at the back of the lots.

The activity of the residents on the all in connection with the restrictions was deplored, and the deputation claimed it was most unreasonable to ask that their property should be depreciated in value for the benefit of those residing further north.

North Toronto Annexation.
City Solicitor Johnston stated in a letter to the board that the officials of North Toronto had requested a conference with the city officials to consider the details of the proposed order of annexation. "I presume," stated Mr. Johnston, "the resolution of expediency passed by the city council some months ago still stands as the basis of the city's assent to the annexation to be made unconditionally." The board informed him that his assumption was correct.

Fair Wage Officer.
The city solicitor notified the board that he had appointed Francis A. Edgell as his own department as fair wage officer. Mr. Johnston takes the stand that the new official should not be a man connected with organized labor in order to do justice to his position. A deputation from the District Labor Council, however, took the opposite view of the case and urged the board to appoint a labor man to insure justice regarding the wages paid by the contractors engaged by the city.

"There has been the greatest indecision on the part of the board of control in making this appointment," said L. H. Gibbons.

"There has been no indecision at all," replied the mayor, "the matter is out of our hands."

The board maintained their attitude and decided that only the council could make a change.

Apartment House.
J. A. Montgomery headed a deputation of residents near the vicinity of Grenadier road and Keble street, who protested against the city permitting an apartment house to be erected at that corner. This district is residential, according to the bylaw, but the builder received his permit before the bylaw was passed and hence the mayor explained, he was permitted to build according to the decision of the courts. It was decided, however, to get reports from the city architect and

No More Shooting.
The board decided to introduce a bylaw to stop shooting in Ashbridge's Bay. Numerous complaints have been received of late, and in some cases windows have been broken by stray shots. NORWICH MAN ADMITS ARSON

William Huggins, Who Set Fire to Valuable Marns, Given Twenty-One Months' Sentence.

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 24.—(Special.)—Twenty-one months in the Central Prison was the sentence meted out to William Huggins of Norwich, who was found guilty at the assizes, now in session here before Chief Justice Mulock, of setting fire to the valuable barns of Chauncey Turner of Norwich in July last.

The chief witness for the prosecution was Provincial Detective Miller, who produced a signed confession by the accused.

W. S. Brewster, K.C., of Bradford, who defended Huggins, attempted to offset the evidence by producing witnesses, who swore that the accused was mentally weak and not capable of understanding what he was signing. However, the jury found him guilty, but in doing so presented a strong plea for mercy. This was taken into consideration by the judge in passing sentence.

APPLE PACKING AS AN ART

GALT, Sept. 25.—(Special.)—Waterloo County, holding first place for size and extent of farmers' institutes, signified again the practical character of its work by holding an apple packing demonstration at E. B. Hallman's farm, New Dundee, Friday. It is the first demonstration of the kind. Apples will be packed in barrels and boxes, graded and marked, and the business of marketing discussed. Leslie Smith of Wellington, an expert packer, will give an address.

WATERLOO CROPS RUINED

GALT, Sept. 24.—(Special.)—Continued heavy weather has practically ruined the root crops, potatoes, carrots, celeriac and celery in various sections of the Waterloo district, where a specialty is made of such crops. A vegetable famine is looked for. Oats, barley and hay are also extensively damaged.

Horse Thief Has a Record

GALT, Sept. 24.—(Special.)—Alexander Hammer, alias Arthur Johnston, Chicago, now in the toils at London for the theft of a valued diamond ring, is well known to the police of Galt, and especially Chief Gorman, who arrested him here in 1904 for sheep and cattle stealing.

Hammer, alias Jones, was sent down by Magistrate Black for seven years since his release Chief Gorman has been waiting for Hammer to come back and make good his threat to have his heart's blood when he got out.

LEAVES MONEY TO CHARITIES

Rev. Dr. Cornish, Late Methodist Statistician, Bequeathed

Amounts Ranging From \$500 to \$100.

Rev. Dr. Cornish, Methodist official statistician, left an estate of \$7906.63. The life interest goes to the widow, and the residue is divided into four equal shares to each of the two sons, and the other half to the daughter.

The will also says: "I give unto my eldest son, George Henry Reynold, my Bible, which was given to me by my father in March, 1850, in which all my sermon texts are marked, also the Book of Common Prayer given to me by my grandmother in April, 1843."

"I give unto my son, Frederick William, my Bible, revised version, with my sermon texts all marked."

"I give unto my daughter, Alexina (Mrs. Fisher), a Sunday School reward book named 'Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego,' given to me in 1843, and 'Park's Travels in Africa,' given to me as a reward of merit in 1865."

After the widow's death the following charities benefit: The Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, \$500; Woman's Auxiliary Society, \$200; Superannuation Fund, \$200; Deaconess Home, \$100; Aged Women's Home, \$100; Hospital for Sick Children, \$100.

After these legacies have been deducted, G. R. Cornish, son of Richard Hill, N.Y., is to receive one-quarter of the residue, F. W. A. Cornish, son, Chicago, the same amount, and his daughter, Mrs. Fisher, Queenston, Ont., one-half of the residue.
