British Troops Attack on 2000 - Yard Front Along the Menin Road and Drive Germans Back 500 Yards.

With the British Armies in France, sept. 17 .-- Another small but important bulge of the Ypres salient into German territory was forced by the British troops yesterday when they attacked on a front of 2000 yards along the Menin road and drove the Germans for a distance of 500 yards.

This advance carried Field Marshal Haig's men within a mile of Hooge, which figured in many flerce conflicts in previous fighting.
