STEWART STILL CHAMPION.

Sergt.-Major Morgans Beaten in a
Brilliant Bayonet Contest.

Only Two Engagements Necessary, High-
lander Winning the First by 5 Points
to 3 and the Second by 5 to 4-Good
House and Splendid Entertainment at
Massey Hall-Rival Soldier Citizens
Cheered on Their Favorites.

Private Stewart of the 48th Highlanders,
champion of the world, secured a decisive
victory over Sergt.-Major Morgans of the
Royal Grenadiers in the 12 years' champion
of America, last night at Massey Hall be-
fore a large assemblage of enthusiastic
spectators. Only two bouts were required,
although near the close it looked as if
Morgans would win the second engage-
ment.

The attendance, as given at the box of-
fice, was 1700. The military turned out in
splendid force, and the Highlanders and
Grenadiers had a battle royal cheering their
favorite, as he secured an advantage in
the melee. There was a fair sprinkling of
ladies present, and as the main attraction
was supplemented by a splendid musical
program everyone enjoyed the evening.

Sergt.-Major's victory were disappointed,
but the progressive style in which his op-
ponent retained the championship left lit-
tle doubt about the respective abilities of
the men, and the Grenadiers must have
away with the impression that their
judge of form was at fault.

wins with a hard pluck, while on at
least three occasions Morgans scored by

ent's armor.
