STORM AMONGST LOYALISTS

Annual Proceedings Marked by Heated
Harangues and Hasty Action.

President Ryerson Votes for Himself,
Stating He Declined to be Shown Out.
Having Elected Himself the Doctor He
Signed—Objected to Captain Merritt
Sending the U. E. L. Address to the
Queen.

The annual meeting of the United
Empire Loyalists, which yesterday
afternoon opened so peaceably in the
Canadian Institute, with the President,
Dr. Ryerson in the chair, ended in the
most lively fashion. The cause of the
friction has been brewing for some time
and culminated yesterday in a painful
display of hot-headed oratory and the
final resignation of the President.

Dr. Ryerson, who was told by Mr.
Stephen M. Jarvis that he had been
"altogether too summary in his treatment
of business and too dictatorial in his
treatment of members."

The following ladies and gentlemen were
proposed for membership: Miss
Laura O'Neil Ireland, Mrs. Carey, Mrs.
Philip Todd, Mrs. James Robinson, Rat
Portage, Captain Forsyth Grant.

Mr. Richard Coleman and Miss Se-
dore were elected to membership.
The report of the Secretary-Treasurer,
Captain W. Hamilton Merritt, showed the
membership of the society to be 167.

The treasurer's report showed receipts
of the year to be \$174.04, expenditure
\$126.52, leaving a balance of \$47.52 ex-
clusive of the Government grant.

The storm broke forth
when the election for the ensuing year
then began, and with nomination of
President the storm broke: Dr. Ryerson
and H. H. Cook were nominated, and
after much discussion it was decided to
revert to the ballot. Then the ruffian
of the constitution prohibits associated
members from voting; this excluded Col.
Dunn, who declared that he would vote
in spite of the President and constitu-
tion; the Colonel's warlike attitude
arousing the suspicions of some of his
friends, the legality of the constitution
was next called into question, and there
was a lively wordy war.

The election proceeded, the gallant
Colonel acting as scrutineer, with the
result that the ballot box showed a tie.
Dr. Ryerson cast his vote in his own
favor, explaining that he would never
have done so but that a canvass had
been made, and that he declined to be
"shoved out."

This did not satisfy the association,
however, and Mr. McEwen, the mover,
with the consent of his second, with-
drew Mr. Cook's name, leaving Dr.
Ryerson in possession.

The Vice-Presidents elected were: Mrs.
J. D. Edgar, Mr. Allan McLean
Howard, Mrs. John McEwen (Alexan-
dria), Lieut.-Colonel Hon. David Thib-
bault, secretary-treasurer, Captain W.
Hamilton Merritt, assistant-secretary,
Mrs. Clarkson.

Execution Committee: E. A. Mac-
Laurin, C. E. Ryerson, Alfred Willson,
Lieut.-Col. G. A. Shaw, David Kemp,
William Roof and Rev. C. E. Ryerson.
Investigating Committee: Messrs. A.
McLean Howard, J. McEwen, W. H.
McEwen. Legal adviser: E. M. Chad-
wick.

The Ladies' Committee remains the
same as last year.

The Doctor Resigns.
The elections over, Dr. Ryerson, who
explained that he was not satisfied with
the conduct of the association, in send-
ing the address of the U.E.L. to the
Queen, had resigned his position, and
the association to Her Majesty's Govern-
ment, the Executive, or any of the
members, then resigned his position, de-
clining under any circumstances to
accept re-election.

Speeches were made by Mr. McLaurin
and other members, and the association
closed, the presidency being left vacant,
upon a scene which left the majority of
the Loyals in a pained bewilderment,
as to what had precipitated the unfortu-
nate contretemps.

WEDDED IN ALL SAINTS.
Mr. William F. Eaton, son of Mr. Timothy
Eaton, yesterday joined the ranks
of the brideless.

In All Saints' Church yesterday morn-
ing a quiet but very pretty wedding
took place when Miss Gertrude Nora
Cook, 21 Eglar-street, became the wife
of Mr. William F. Eaton, second son
of Mr. T. Eaton, Rev. Mr. Baldwin
was the officiating clergyman. Quite a
number of intimate friends and relatives
of the couple were present to witness the
ceremony. From the T. Eaton Co. store
were nearly all the department managers.
The bride was tastefully gowned and
was given away by her brother, Mr.
James Cook. Her sister, Miss Ida Cook,
was bridesmaid. Mr. John C. Eaton, a
brother of the groom, was best man.

After the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Eaton
left for their future home in Mani-
toba. At the depot a large number
gathered and gave the newly wedded
couple a hearty send-off.
