Imposing Demonstration Last Evening—Impressive Service in St. Michael's Cathedral—Great Testimonies of Respect for the Late Prelate.

Not for a decade—not since the funeral of Archbishop Lennox, in 1888—has there been such a demonstration of love, esteem and respect as that showed last night in connection with the obsequies of Archbishop Walsh. The almost unique manifestation was spontaneous and well-nigh universal. Protestants vie with Catholics fellow-citizens in rendering honor, even in death, to one to whom honor was due, and never was the tribute more worthily bestowed.

It was not the funeral in the ordinary sense of the word, but the solemn transference of the remains of the Archbishop from his late residence, St. John's Gore, to the Church of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, in the archdiocesan church of St. Michael's. Short as the notice had been, it was sufficient to induce tens of thousands of the citizens to pay their last tribute to the memory of one whose sterling qualities of head and heart had been abundantly manifested in their midst.

In a solemn and impressive service, which was a manifold more nobles (Catholics and Protestants alike) through the long process of procession, and bare-headed saw the passage of the procession to the sacred spot where rest the remains of the prelate, occupants of the St. Michael's.

Nothing more silently eloquent or solemnly impressive could be witnessed. The joyous sounds of childhood were for the nonce hushed, and reverent awe was the predominant sentiment of young and old alike. And quietly awaiting the solemn cortege the minute bell of St. Michael's sounded on the sultry evening air, and in whispered tones were heard all along the line the solemn dirges, which, in a monotonous way, rang through the air from the mouths of the good men who had so unexpectedly heard the divine summons, "Well done, good and faithful servant." "Come up higher."

Subjoined are details verifying this general statement, and testifying to the remarkable spontaneous demonstration, alike in and without the sacred edifice, where the Archbishop Walsh loved to minister and from whose faithful lips had fallen the water of life to many a thirsty soul.

Within the glorious pile the scene was well high indescribable. The requiem music, the hearts bowed down, the suppressed sob, the consolatory holy chiasm and psalm—musical and stately in character in the joyful restoration and the glorious gathering of the general assembly and creed and all place and earth's discords forever ceased.

Today, at the lying-in-state, the solemn scenes of yesterday will be repeated, and the prayer will ascend from the hearts of the living, and the souls of the departed will ascend to God for the rest of their journey.
