Many surmises were made as to his identity, but none could guess the truth. On Friday the cat was out of the bag, when he, accompanied by Chief Coleman, drove up near Glen Miller and found a couple of wagon loads of stolen goods in the dwelling of one Ellis, who has been discovered to be a noted thief and the head of a gang. Ellis had flown to Marmora, but Smith, who turned out to be Detective Holland of the Canadian Detective Agency, Toronto, quickly

Detective Holland is of the opinion that he can convict Ellis of arson in connection with the burning of Glen Miller Paper Mills last month. The prisoner has practically connected himself with the fire, as, when asked about it, he said he would tell nothing "unless the other fellows did." Detective Holland is after the "other fellows" hot-foot, and, from the hard work done on small clues during the past weeks, he will not fail. A startling denouement is momentarily expected. The detective has won great praise here for his skilful work and credit is also due Inspector James for his connection with the case.
