WHERE IS THE PRESBYTERIAN

CONSCIENCE?

Not unfrequently are the faces of

prominent Presbyterian clergymen seen

on the platform of political gather-

ings. Quite a few of them look

upon Sir Oliver Mowat as a sort of

political saint. But have they heard of

the criminality of his successors? Do

they realize the fact that the country is

overrun with criminals, who win the

elections for the Liberal party by stealing

and forging ballots? Do they know that

the present Liberal Government owes its con-

tinuance in office to the crimes of Preston

and his machine confederates? Do they

know that the judges have reported two

score or more individuals for trial, and that

the Ontario Government has clogged the

wheels of justice to prevent their friends

from being sent to jail and themselves

from exposure? Apparently not, because

the public has heard of no protest from

the Presbyterian press or pulpit. The fact

that Sir Oliver Mowat once published a

classic on "The Evidence of Christianity"

surely does not tie up the Presby-

terian denomination to Liberalism for all

time, and as understood and practised by

the degenerates who have succeeded Mowat.

Something is radically wrong with our

Presbyterian friends, if they will not

take such a thing as a Presbyterian conscience,

it has become dull and callous. By attend-

ing political gatherings the Presbyterian

clergy give the people to understand that

politics is not too profane a subject for

ministers of the gospel to entertain and dis-

cuss. If they can extol Mowat for his

virtues, why can't they denounce Gibson

and Ross and Dryden for their shortcom-

ings? If political virtue is worthy of

praises, political vice is worthy of denuncia-

tion. What has the Presbyterian con-

science to say on the latter?

MAKE WAY FOR THE MACHINE.

It is significant that The Globe has up to

date made no specific defence of any of the

Ontario Ministers who have recently been

indicted in the press for complicity with

the machine, breach of public trust and other

serious charges. The case against Attorney-

General Gibson has been established so

clearly that The Globe can offer no defence

whatsoever. As to the other complicity

of their most recent sales on account of

capital, the whole of which is now turned

into revenue, is that of the Jamieson lot

at the northwest corner of Queen and

Yonge-streets, probably the most valuable

piece of property in the whole Province.

This property was producing a good annual

rental, and this rental was good for an in-

crease, yet it was sold for \$101,250. This

entire sum will be spent this year, and,

after this, the rent the Province has been

receiving in the past will forever cease.

Other valuable properties are going in the

same way every day, and soon Ontario will

have nothing in the way of revenue, but

what she gets as a subsidy from the Dom-

inion Parliament and what may be got

from direct taxation.

A few more years of Liberal rule in On-

tario will give the people an experience of

direct taxation. The machinery for rais-

ing funds by direct taxation has already

been supplied by the Legislature. The
