

A few more years of Liberal rule in Ontario will give the people an experience of direct taxation. The machinery for raising funds by direct taxation has already been supplied by the Legislature. The Government is anticipating that the day is not distant when the people will have to pay Provincial taxes according to the same system as they now pay municipal axes. Clause 131 of the Assessment Act make the necessary provision. It reads as fol

lows:

131.—All moneys assessed, levied and collected, under any act by which the same are made payable to the Treasurer of this Province, or other public officer for the public use of the Province, or for any special purpose or use mentioned in the Act, shall be assessed, levied and collected in the same manner as local rates, and shall be similarly calculated upon the assessments as finally revised, and shall be entered in the collectors' rolls, in separate columns, in the heading whereof shall be designated the purpose of the rate; and the Clerk shall deliver the roll, certified under his hand, to the Collector, on or before the 1st day of October, or such other day as may be prescribed by bylaw of the local municipality.

The reason for the first condition should be perfectly plain to men who think. It demonstrates the influence of just government on all commercial and industrial enterprises. Englishmen know that in the end the Transvaal will come under the domination of their government, and they further know that from the date of British occupancy the outrageous exactions which characterized the Kruger regime will disappear. Then "Kaffirs" will be worth more than ever. In other words, there will be no rake off for the oligarchy. This sound business principle has been illustrated with us so recently that it is hardly necessary to dwell upon it. In 1896 the people declared in favor of honest money and immediately a restoration of confidence was noticeable. At an earlier date it was lilustrated conversely. More than a generation ago Mississippi repudiated her state debt; she has not yet recovered from the blow to her credit, and it is not likely she ever will. All values depend more than we are apt to think in our measure of faith in the powers that be. As to the inactivity of wheat, the war in South Africa is scarcely of sufficient importance to affect that cereal at a time when the new crop is being marketed.
