LENTEN REGULATIONS

For the Roman Catholic Diocese of London.

The following are the Lenten regulations for the Diocese of London:
1. All days of Lent, Sundays excepted, are fast days. 2. By a special indust from the holy see, A.D. 1884, meat is allowed on Sundays at every meal, and at one meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except the Saturday of Ember week and Holy Saturday. 3. The use of flesh and fish at the same time is not allowed in Lent. The following persons are exempted

from abstinence, viz.: Children under years, and from fasting, persons under 21; and from either or both, those who, on account of ill-health, advanced age, hard labor, or some other legitimate cause, cannot observe the law. In case of doubt the pastor should be consulted. Lard may be used in preparing fasting food during the season of Lent, except on Good Friday, as also on all

by those who cannot easily procure butter. Pastors are required to hold in their Dundas St. respective churches, at least twice in the week during Lent, devotions and instructions suited to the holy season, and they should earnestly exhort their people to attend these public devotions.

They are hereby authorized to give on these occasions benediction of the blessed sacrament. Besides the public devotions, family prayers, especially the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin, should be recited in every Catholic household of the diocese.


