STIFF SENTENCE FOR BAD GANG

Boy Thieves Get from Three to Five Years at Kingston—Chinaman Gets His.

Judge Elliott handed out some stiff sentences this morning at the court-house, when the four young boys, members of the notorious east end gang, were up for sentence.

Wm. McDonald, with a suspended sentence hanging over him, was given five years in Kingston Penitentiary on each of three charges of stealing junk. The sentences will run concurrently. Ernest Langley, who pleaded guilty to three charges of theft, will spend the next four years in the Kingston Penitentiary. The same dose was given on the three counts, but the sentences will also run concurrently.

Wm. Lake was found guilty on two charges. He was in the junk-collecting agency with the rest, and was also guilty of stealing \$10 and some change out of the pockets of Martin Kenny, while being a gang of thieves that he operated among the farmers of East Middlesex for some time. His lordship was determined to break up the gang, and therefore imposed stiff sentences on the bunch. McDonald and Langley are somewhat larger than Ward and Lake, but they are not so cunning. The little fellows are certainly foxy.

Ward and Lake were tried this morning on the charge of stealing from Martin Kenny. Lake told the story, and acknowledged that he and Ward had gone to the Bond Mills cheese factory, and during their explorations after a football they discovered a pair of trousers belonging to Mr. Kenny. Both boys made a grab for the pants, but Lake found the money. They then proceeded to get out, but were chased, and the money was found in the field where Lake had dropped it. Ward denied this story, and said that he had nothing to do with the stealing. The evidence of several witnesses, however, convinced his lordship that he was equally guilty with Lake.

Quong Wing, alias Lee Chong, appeared before Judge Elliott for trial, on a charge of stealing a gold watch and chain from the clothes of a boarder at the Sadler House. The evidence clearly showed the Chinaman to be guilty, and he was sentenced to six months in the Central Prison.

Crown Attorney McKillop prosecuted all the cases, and he and High Constable Hughes are being congratulated on successfully breaking up that east end gang.

High Constable Hughes also located three sets of harness stolen by this gang. Two of the sets have been returned to their owners and the other will be shortly.

Mrs. Craigie (John Oliver Hobbs) Passes Suddenly Away at London.

London, Aug. 13.—Mrs. Pearl Marley Teresa Craigie (John Oliver Hobbs), the authoress and dramatist, died in her sleep this morning of heart failure.

Her death was totally unexpected, she having been apparently perfectly well when she retired last night. Mrs. Craigie had been spending a fortnight at her home, Steephill Castle, Ventnor, Isle of Wight, which she left Sunday afternoon to keep an engagement in London. She was 39 years of age.

Pearl Mary Teresa Richards ("John Oliver Hobbs") English novelist and dramatist, born Boston, Mass., November 3, 1867. She was educated in Paris and London, married R. W. Craigie in England in 1887, and was divorced from him in 1895.

Her writings published under the pseudonym, "John Oliver Hobbs," include: "Some Emotions and a Moral" (1891), "The Sinner's Comedy" (1892), "A Study in Temptations" (1893), "A Bundle of Life" (1894), "Journey's End in Lovers' Meetings" ("The Gods, Mortals and Lord Wickenham" (1895), "The Herb Moon" (1896), "School for Saints" (1897), "Asborn and Ursyne," a blank verse tragedy (1899), "The Ambassador," a play (1898), "Robert Orange" (1900), "The Serious Wooing" (1901).

WENT THROUGH BRIDGE. Driver Hurt When Traction Engine Drops Twelve Feet.

Ayton, Aug. 14.—As Wm. Neerton was driving his traction engine and water tank over a bridge at Ailsford, in the township of Normandy, the bridge gave way, carrying down with it the whole outfit, a distance of twelve feet. Mr. Neerton was badly hurt, having been caught under the fallen timbers. One of his legs is broken in two places, and he is also badly scalded by water leaking from the engine.

THE HARVESTERS' RUSH. Four Thousand from Western Ontario for First Excursion.

Toronto, Aug. 14.—Nearly every train which arrived at the Union Station this morning from points in Ontario along the north and south of the main line of the Grand Trunk from Toronto to Sarnia brought in large numbers of persons who are going to Western Canada on the harvesters' excursion, which leaves here today. It is estimated by the railways that ten trains will be required to take all who are coming in westward. Four thousand persons at least are expected to go out on the excursion. This is the largest number who have ever left here on the first excursion.

BOYS AS SERVANTS. Woman Starts Agency to Supply Her Sex in the Household.

London, Aug. 14.—A battalion of page boys, captained by a motherly cook, is the latest solution of the servant problem. The battalion is being organized by a lady, who described her idea yesterday.

"I propose to start an agency of small page boys, who will do the work of a lady's maid, and who will be regulated by the work done and the time taken to do it.

The uniform will be dark green, with silver buttons, and the cook will wear a dark green linen dress to correspond.

"There will be a kitchen boy, a drawing-room boy, a dining-room boy, and each will be trained for their respective work."

MULLAH RAIDS AGAIN. Kills 1,000 Tribesmen and Carries off 10,000 Camels.

London, Aug. 13.—The correspondent at Aden of the Daily Mail reports that the Mad Mullah has raided the Somaliland border and killed more than one thousand of the Rereharon tribe dwelling in the Ogaden region and captured ten thousand camels.

In December, 1905, in pursuance of an agreement between Great Britain and Italy to offer the Mullah an assignment of a settled sphere in Somaliland, together with grazers' rights in certain parts of British and Italian territory, the Mullah undertook to observe peace toward both Great Britain and Italy. This arrangement, it was believed, had brought to an end the difficult and costly British expeditions against the Mullah and delivered the protectorate tribes from his devastating raids.

GREAT FIRE AT NOVGOROD. Nishni Novgorod, Russia, Aug. 14.—The suburb of Gordievka is in flames, and the fire is spreading, but as yet the great fair buildings are not endangered. One body has been found and it is thought that a number of other persons have lost their lives in the conflagration.

MISSIONARIES WED. Belleville, Aug. 14.—Miss V. Sinclair, sister of Alderman Sinclair, of this city, and a leading member of the Presbyterian Mission staff at Indore, India, was today married to Rev. Jas. MacKay, also a member of the Indore staff. Miss Sinclair visited her home some little time ago and made many friends. Rev. and Mrs. MacKay will continue at their post at Indore.

HIS MAJESTY OFF TO THE CONTINENT

British King and German Kaiser to Meet at Friedrichshof Tomorrow.

London, Aug. 14.—King Edward left London today for the continent, traveling to Port Victoria, by special train and crossing the North Sea to Flushing, where he will land this evening.

On the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, which will be conveyed by two British cruisers, the German and Austrian ambassadors were among those who assembled at the railroad station to see the King off. The greatest interest is manifested in the meeting between King Edward and Emperor William, which is to take place at Friedrichshof, Aug. 15.

THE TORONTO STRIKE

Building Operation May Be Tied Up by Sympathetic Walk Out.

Toronto, Aug. 14.—Five thousand men, representative of the building trade in Toronto, will be on strike at 5 o'clock tonight, if the carpenters' strike is not settled. This is the action of the men have taken to bring the trouble to a termination as speedily as possible.

The immense amount of building going on in Toronto now is to be tied up in a sympathetic attitude toward the striking carpenters. This was decided upon last night, after nearly four hours of animated discussion by the Federated Council of Building Trades, at a most representative meeting in the Labor Temple. At 5 o'clock tonight the trades, with the exception of the bricklayers and bricklayers' laborers, will put away their tools until the carpenters' difficulty with the employers is settled. The trades interested are plumbers, sheet metal workers, plasterers, lathers, steamfitters, painters, electrical workers, stone cutters and marble workers.

JAPAN FORGING AHEAD. Rapid Strides in Industrial Pursuits of Mikado's Subjects.

London, Aug. 14.—"Japan is making rapid progress," says the British commercial attaché at Tokio in his report on the trade of Japan for 1905. In 1902 her imports and exports amounted to \$54,107,562, in 1905 to \$82,654,869.

Raw cotton of the value of \$1,153,000 was imported in 1905, as against \$7,296,000 in 1904, and 150,000 spindles are being added to the native cotton mills.

The two new giant battleships of 19,000 tons are being built with Japanese steel, and a leading Japanese shipbuilder has stated that ships can be built as cheaply if not cheaper, in Japan than in the United Kingdom.

The native oil industry has nearly doubled in one year, "greatly assisted by the extra war duty."

JESUIT ELECTIONS. Rome, Aug. 14.—Preparations are proceeding actively for the Congressional election of Jesuits to elect a new general of the order. They expect to meet Sept. 1. America will be represented by the Very Rev. T. J. Gannon, of New York, the provincial of Maryland, and the Very Rev. H. M. O'Connell, provincial of Missouri, representing altogether 1,750 Jesuits. The election is likely to occur Sept. 8.
