Nothing definite was done last evening at the joint meeting of the hospital trust and the special committee appointed by the council. The plans of the new isolation hospital were presented by Mr. A. E. Nutter, city architect, and were compared with those prepared by Mr. Victor Mitchell under the direction of the trust. The plans of Mr. Nutter seemed to find practically universal favor with the committee. They show an up-to-date hospital building, with plenty of light and ventilation, in both of which experts say that the original plans were deficient.
