French Advance, British Victory in Mesopotamia, the Greek Acceptance of Allied Dem ands and Bright Prospects of Irish Settlement Bring Real "Merry Christmas" To

London, Dec. 16.-The week closes in enthusiasm and optimism for Britain and her allies.

Four big military and diplomatic victories are proclaimed by today's papers as showing tremendous fillip to the Allies' cause induced by recent drastic reorganizations in the British and French governments. Britain settles down to Christmas shopping and cultivation of Christmas spirit with a great load of uncertainty and anxiety lifted from its shoulders.

The French advance near Meuse River, with capture of probably nine thousand German prisoners, fifty machine guns, large stores and some guns of larger calibre, with eleven square miles of territory, including fifteen important villages, farms and other points of vantage, was a welcomed thrust for the Allies.

Even more unexpected was the news of the big advance of Major-Gen. Maude's columns in Mesopotamia against the Turks, right up to the very gates of famous Kut. Saturday afternoon reports from Cairo say this advance is continuing with great success, and heavy captures of Turkish troops, guns and materials. Today Athens dispatches corroborate reports that King Constantine's Government has completely acquiesced in the demands of the Allies' latest ultimatum.

Another "diplomatie" victory, more local to Britain, is the possibility of the more immediate prospect of a settlement of the Irish question, as developed by debate in the House of Commons

NO COUNTER ATTACKS.

Paris, Dec. 16 .- Although there has been a lively bombardment along the entire front north of Verdun, from the Meuse to the Woevre, over which the French swept in their advance of yesterday, no counter-attack was delivered by the Germans during the night, says today's war office statement.

Four French divisions engaged in yesterday's attack took prisoner soldiers belonging to every regiment of five German divisions, the statement adds.

Paris, Dec. 15 .- As his last act before assuming the chief command of the French armies on the western front, Gen. Nivelle today smashed the German line east of the Meuse along a front of six miles. The victory has advanced the French positions two miles, and they are now within a short distance of where the Germans stood at the outset of the great Verdun drive. The military authorities describe the victory as complete and crushing, and carried out without a hitch.
