MORE CLAIMS REGISTERED

Building Sewage Plant, Demand Money.

Claims against the Arnott Construction Company, Toronto, in charge of the building of the sewage disposal works were recorded at the meeting of the board of control this morning. Gibson, Levy & Gibson, Hamilton, solicitors for the Canadian Crushed Stone Company, Dundas, notified the board that they had blaced a lien against the structure for 11,672, for stone furnished the Arnott Company. The Grand Trunk Railway Company notified the mayor that it had a claim for \$127 freight. Controller John M. Moore stated that the city had paid wages of the men employed on the work to the amount of about \$700. The company had failed to give the men their money, and in order to prevent the work from stopping, the sity had to make good to them. These accounts were referred to Chipman & Powers, the engineers on the work.
